

On New Years I saw the East-West Game in San Francisco and it was one of the finest football games I have ever seen. The Shrine parade was most colorful and impressive.



A tentative building program is now under consideration at the University of Missouri. Our required program for all freshman and sophomore men makes this possibility seem highly undesirable, from our departmental point of view.

Dr. Hindman, director of physical education at the University of Missouri, is preparing some recommendations to present to the University Planning Committee. He feels that his recommendations will carry more weight if he can cite some facts relative to the facilities and programs of some of our neighbors.

I have been asked to solicit such information from a number of such sources. I hope you will oblige me by supplying the information you think pertinent. If you are too busy winning another Big Six Basketball Championship to attend to this personally, will you kindly ask one of your staff members to do the job.

The inclosed sheet is a hasty and crude attempt to indicate the nature of the "dope" we should like to have. Any additional items, however, may be added at your discretion. Your cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.






