Dear Mr. Callahan:

I am sending you a carbon copy of the memorandum I have written to Chancellor Malott. Things are so disturbed that I do not believe you could get a three-day institute or conference that would get the people here that you would want. And too, three days would be too short.

I believe a four-weeks refresher course would come nearer to doing the job. We might tack on a conference to be held just about the time of the closing of the four-weeks refresher course. That would help the people enrolled, and also perhaps by that time things would be more stabilized. And at the end of this refresher course the contacts that these superintendents and principals might make with the people in the course would prove profitable to both the superintendents and the students.

But right now, at this time, so many of the schools are having their examinations and graduations, and also opening their various summer terms, that I believe confusion would result, rather than order.
