

Two new concrete tennis courts at the University of Kansas will be ready for use next week, Dr. F. C. Allen, head of the physical education department, announced today. These comprise the first unit of <sup>concrete</sup> tennis courts at the University, ~~and make~~ <sup>which</sup> total of 24 courts altogether.

Located south of the west side of the stadium, the new courts are built on the site of the <sup>University's courts</sup> original near Potter Lake. Lights <sup>will be</sup> installed for night games, and players <sup>will be</sup> limited to one set <sup>at all times.</sup> University students and faculty members will have free use of the courts, Dr. Allen said, but because of the expected demand, other persons desiring to use them may do so only by paying a fee of \$10 per year.

Dr. Allen added that the concrete courts <sup>Rave surfaces</sup> are not only vastly superior <sup>also</sup> to those <sup>in the long run,</sup> playing on gravel courts, but will be ~~more~~ more economical for the University, <sup>requiring little</sup> as they require little care. The old courts cost \$1 each for rolling and marking after ~~each rain.~~ The new courts will have permanent white cement markers.

Prof. R S Howey, who coached the University tennis team this spring, expressed delight with the new courts, especially with the 21 feet of space back of the base lines and 10 feet on each side.
