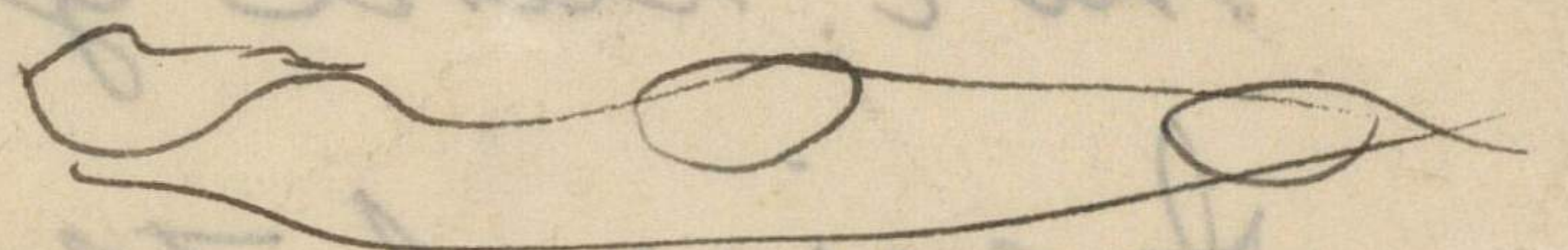
Dear Uncle "Phog",

I just received the letter from the Rock Island for you and am sending the same to you. We play the Central Missouri State Teachers College of Warrensburg this afternoon so I am just cleaning off some odds and ends. I got a letter from Ray Evans this morning, acknowledging the Jayhawk Rebounds, as you acknowledged in your letter of Monday. The boys do seem to appreciate it and I am glad to be of any service that I can.

We are playing a Homecoming game against the A.S.T.P. here on Friday evening. They are having their Homecoming celebration in Hoch, and are building the basketball game around it. Our boys are awfully light but when we get our full power I believe we will have a pretty good team. We have a light team now and a strong wind would blow them out of the hall. The Army boys are big and tough. They have boys from Pennsylvania, Illinois and Indiana, and they look good, but it won't hurt the boys to perhaps get a licking in the early stages because they are against some very tough competition.

I enjoyed your discourse on the Penn game. I listened to it over the radio and it seemed as if Navy had tremendous power and grew stronger due to their reserves and the scarcity of Penn's reserves. Mit was at the house last night and when I came home and got your letter I read it to him. I will send the letter on to Mother so that she will have the advantage of reading another letter from you. I wrote her night before last.

I just called Mr. Cote this morning and he already has your ticket from the office on the 18th of December from Chicago to Kansas City, and he is now wiring Chicago for the parlor car ticket for January first, Kansas City to Chicago.

Mother will get home December 6 so she will have plenty of time to play for a nice Christmas.

I note what you say regarding Tuck being crazy for lack of something to do, and that she will do your paper for you. I think that is a nice thing and I thanked Mrs. Hulteen for you as you asked me to for her willingness to do the paper. I will be delighted to have Tuck make a carbon copy so that I can read it. I am tremendously interested and I will be glad to see your work of art on "The Etiology of Dissecting Aneurysms." I'll bet it is a complete survey and I will be naturally proud of your effort. And, of course, naturally I will learn a lot. I am always glad to get those tips as it makes a fellow better informed if he never uses it for anything but general information.

Mother and I had planned to go to Warrensburg this morning to attend the funeral of Mr. Tom Cheatham who was stricken with apoplexy and passed away day before yesterday. I have to speak tonight at the Men's Brotherhood at 7:30 at a Methodist gathering, and since I am chairman of the hill drive for the National War Fund and Community Chest, it has been keeping me pretty much on the job. So Mother gave it up, figuring there would be too many hypertensions in making the connections there and back, what with the gasoline shortage and a lot of other duties that might interfere with the whole schedule.

So she is writing Mrs. Cheatham and today I plan to sit down at the noon hour and write her a letter extending to her our deepest sympathy. They were grand people and fine friends of ours. In fact, they were two of the most decent people, and when I say decent I mean very, very wealthy people who were fine and commonplace as Irving Hill is in this town. It hurt me when I found Mother was not going, but although I wanted to go myself, since I had planned on going, I knew that it was not the right thing to do so I gave it up and will convey my deepest feeling to Mrs. Cheatham by mail.

Kansas leaves tomorrow for Nebraska, and the odds layers - the gamblers who offer parlay odds - are making Kansas the favorite over Nebraska by six points. Can you imagine that! Whenever did Kansas rate as favorite? Personally, I am just a little fearful of the result because Nebraska has played Minnesota, Indiana and Iowa State, and Kansas' competition hasn't been nearly as strong. But the win last Saturday against Washburn I am sure will be helpful rather than hurtful. I do not know about Nebraska's punters or anything about them, but two of their stars were kept out of the Iowa State game because of injuries and they are back in the game for Kansas. So I am just afraid that something might happen that would not work out according to the dope, but I must remember that the gamblers are not sentimentalists and if they gave Nebraska six points, then Nebraska must be terribly weak.

We have a good team for war time conditions, if you know what I mean. Henry and Elmer are doing a fine job and they will get the most out of the men, but I just have a sneaking feeling that Nebraska will show more power against us than many people realize.


