On July 18, 1943 it will be twenty-five years since we came together as the 20th Company of the 1918 S.A.T.C. Camp at Fort Sheridan. The printed Roster of the Company [published that summer by Emmett Long, now of Follansbee, W.Va.] lists 204 men ---nearly all of them being professors or administrative officers of colleges and universities of the Middle West and South. The 1918 Roster gave highest degrees and academic affiliations of the members of the Company, and that information does not need to be repeated here.

In many ways the Company had a distinguished personnel: Thirty-two members of the Company were listed with Doctor's degrees [Ph.D., M.D., D.D.S., D.V.M., and S.J.D.], and fifty-five others had Master's degrees. In the twenty-five years that have elapsed, there has been a great increase in the numbers of members who have Doctor's degrees. The number of men listed in "Who's Who in America" has greatly increased, also, as would be expected: I understand that Dungay, Snell, Scutar, and perhaps Place, have gotten the M.D. degree since our Fort Sheridan days.

Among the men of the Company whose careers I have followed, the following might be especially mentioned: W. S. Allen, president of Statson University since 1934; R. W. Crum, director of the highway research board, National Research Council, since 1928; R. C. Flickinger, head-professor of Latin and Greek at the University of Iowa since 1925; F. J. Kelly, chief of the division of colleges and professional schools of the U. S. Office of Education since 1931; T. J. Meek, professor of oriental languages at the University of Toronto since 1923; Alfred Owre, who died in 1935; as dean of the school of dentistry at Columbia University; H. D. Phillips, P. E. Bishop of Southwestern Virginia since 1938; B. E. Schmitt, professor of modern history at the University of Chicago since 1925; Jaun Sundwall, professor of hygiene and public health at the University of Michigan since 1921; and of course Knut Rockne, whose tragic death in 1931 was a nation-wide concern. I have information of the deaths of the following men of our Company: dates, as far as I know them, are given in the list of present-addresses of the living members of the Company. Those deceased members are: A. T. Adams, R. B. Allen, H. H. Bass, E. C. Buss, R. E. Carter, J. C. Davis, W. W. Duan, Logan Esarey, H. D. Funk, H. S. Gentry, S. I. Langmaid, W. E. Lockhart, J. H. Loomis, R. B. McGhee, J. W. Moss, Isaiah L. Miller, G. B. Mortimer, Alfred Owre, C. E. Pike, K. K. Rockne, L. C. Slesman, and Keith K. Smith.

Over the years, the memories of our short and hectic experience at Fort Sheridan have been a good deal of satisfaction to me---principally because of the men who were members of the Company. I assume that many of you feel the same way. Many men you may care to renew acquaintance with by correspondence, even after the lapse of all these years. While you may not recall some of the men, you may remember a great many, with pleasure. I felt a distinct sense of loss at the deaths of R. B. Allen, Carter, Funk, Langmaid, and Miller; and a great deal of pleasure to see how many of the Company have done and accomplished good things.

I have tried to secure as fully as possible present addresses, but some of them, (furnished by college alumni offices) may be incorrect or outdated. Other involuntary errors may have crept in, and these I greatly regret. "N.R" after a name indicates that repeated and diversified inquiries gave no results. In those cases where a biography is available, the source is indicated in brackets: "WW" (Who's Who in America); "AMS" (American Men of Science); "DAS" (Directory of American Scholars); "WVEngr" (Who's Who in Engineering); "LE" (Leaders in Education); "TxWW" (Texian Who's Who). I have not included degrees and titles; as this is not intended to be a Directory, but merely a list of present addresses. . . . I shall be glad to receive corrections and emendations, so far as you can give them.

This must come from your side of the house.

Now, you ask about Hubert. I certainly would say that he owes that \$500. I didn't have any idea that you had put any money into it. It is too darn bad that you did that, but I believe Hubert is enough of a man that if you would write him he would certainly come through. You shouldn't have to write him, but I certainly wouldn't hold back a minute in doing so. I, too, had a lot of work done and always paid promptly the bills, but they never asked me to put in any and I certainly would not have done so because, Stella, I always feel that the best way is to handle your own money. It is an interesting thing how people work hard for money, save it, and then loan it to someone else to lose for them.

I would tell Hubert when you write him that you want it to use for Put's college education and ask him if he won't even pay \$10.00 a month. He could certainly do that if he wants to make good. If you had asked my advice I would certainly have advised against it, but of course that is too late.

He must be a grand fellow. When you write to him please tell him that we think he is doing a swell job in pushing the Heinies back in the hole from which they started. No, I never had the pleasure of meeting him, but Dick often told me what a grand fellow he was and I wish you would extend my best wishes and congratulations to him.

I am awfully glad to know of the success of Hubert, Jr. He is a fine boy. Bobby Allen will finish the University of Pennsylvania Medical School in less than a month and will interne at Bell Memorial Hospital in Kansas City, Kansas. No, you certainly have not asked too much of me. In fact, anything that I can do I want you to feel perfectly free to call upon me.

I am glad to know that Put played on the Heart of American ball team. I know how proud his father would have been to see him so high in academics, athletics and musical scores.

Dear Forest,

Seems as though I never write unless there is something I want. However it is only advice this time. One in a while problems of raising a boy almost get me down. Fut was 16 yrs. old the 14th of Aug. He weighs around 160 lbs. ^{is 5ft 7 1/4 in tall} and Coach Markey thinks he should play football. Coach Peters feels the same way about basket ball. This is Fut's last year in H.S. and he plans to enter K. U. a year from now. I have not consented to him playing either football or basket ball for several reasons. You remember

that in his Freshman year he had a lead spot on his lungs and altho he seems to be over that long ago, I've always been cautious about letting him take chances. Then this spring he had high blood pressure - nearly 155. He brought it down to 130, and that was in June. Now then, if he passes the physical exams, do you think he should be allowed to take part in these things? Coach Peters didn't find out who he was until this spring for Put won't trade on any one else's prestige - but Peters thinks he will make a good basket ball player.

Put plans to come out to X.M. in 1945 - He will have a year before the draft would get him -

He would like for you to
§ send him a copy of the
entrance requirements. He has
taken college entrance requirements
all through H. S. He has played
special attention to mathematics.
He has worked all summer & has
saved over \$200. But he made
never less than \$32⁰⁰ and usually

Dear Granddad:

I am sending you a copy of part of a letter that I wrote Bess when she was in California. I endeavored to explain to her why I accepted certain speaking dates and did certain things that called me away from home many, many times. She felt that I should let down and not be so strenuous in my activities.

At first I really could not explain fully to her why I did the things I did, but as the years went on the thoughts crystallized and I was able to explain them to her in my own way. I sent a carbon of the letter to each one of the children, and it was interesting to study their reactions. Some thought I was terribly dissapointed and hurt; others thought that I was gathering some data to present to the Chancellor for a raise, and none of these things were true except that I was hurt when the Board of Regents did what they did because I was bending every effort to have the most successful department possible and that meant winning football games and other activities that I was concerned with.

But the real reason was to explain to her that I felt very much as Casey did when he got his revenge by knocking a home run. I have been able to accomplish the things that I had always wanted to accomplish but which some people misunderstood.

I enjoyed seeing you Sunday and am working on the problem and will get it done at the earliest possible moment. I am enclosing the letter that Ethel gave me yesterday. Will you please give it to her? I have the essential information.

The three Appraisers selected by you, to-wit: Robert L. Hood, Chris Sebolt and John H. Hardin, have viewed all the lands and properties in question, and in a conference today they have made appraisals of the various properties as follows:

Home Place, 110 Acres,--Land appraised at \$11,000., Improvements \$5,000,-- Total	\$16,000.
Land South of 39th Street and East of Lee's Summit Road, 130 Acres at \$75. per acre	9,750.
Land on Highway No. 40:	
7 $\frac{1}{2}$ Acres and dwelling	1,550.
10 Acres W. of Blue & N. of Highway	1,300.
28 Acres S. of Highway	2,800.
19.39 Acres on Lee's Summit Road, with Improvements	3,600.
Dwelling in Blue Springs	<u>1,000.</u>
Grand Total	\$36,000.

In all these properties, R. F. Milton has an undivided one-half interest, and the four children have an undivided one-half interest among them. The encumbrances are as follows, including Principal Only:

On the 240 Acres	\$7,200.
On the 19.39 Acres	2,000.
On the 45 Acres on Hwy. 40	<u>825.</u>
Total	10,025.

Deducting this principal encumbrance from the total appraised value of \$36,000., leaves \$25,975.

One-half of \$25,975 equals \$12,987.50.

In addition to his share of the principal indebtedness, Mr. R. F. Milton owes individual debts as follows:

Interest on said loans	\$ 475.
Taxes to date on lands	745.50
To James C. Milton on Notes, including interest	11,301.
To Bessie Allen, Note & interest	670.50
To Ethel Hughes, Note & Int.	460.
To the four children, one-half amount received from the State in 1940	1,060.

To Dr. Stewart Gilmer	<u>\$105.</u>
Total indebtedness	\$4,817.50

Deducting the above \$4,817. from \$12,987.50 leaves \$8,170.50 as the net value of Mr. R. F. Milton's one-half.

Dividing \$8,170.50 by five gives \$1,634.10. If the dwelling in Blue Springs be set off to Mr. R. F. Milton and wife, and he be given \$634.10 by the four children either in cash or short time notes, this would equal his one-fifth as above mentioned. The four children could at the same time make such further provisions as is equitable for the support of Mr. Milton for the remainder of his life.

The Appraisers suggest the above, and that all the lands be then divided among the four children. They will of course have to each assume or pay one-fourth of the total indebtedness, that is the \$10,025 principal, and the \$4,817., -- totalling \$14,842.

One-fourth of this indebtedness is \$3,710.50. However, each of the four children could deduct from \$3,710.50 what is due them respectively, which is as follows:

Due James C. Milton, Notes \$1301 and \$265. (1/4 of \$1060)	\$1566.
Due George Milton (1/4 of \$1060)	265.
Due Bessie Allen, Note \$670.50 and \$265 (1/4 of \$1060)	935.50
Due Ethel Hughes, Note \$460 and \$265 (1/4 of \$1060)	725.

Making these deductions, would leave the children owing the following amounts:

James C. Milton	\$2,144.50
George Milton	3,445.50
Bessie Allen	2,775
Mrs. Ethel Hughes	2,985.50

Your Appraisers suggest that all parties interested meet and see if a division of the lands cannot be made by agreement. On the values set, if two of the children received the home place at \$16,000. and the 7½ Acres on Highway 40 at \$1550. they would receive \$17,550., at the appraised value, and if the other two children received the 130 Acres at \$9750. the 28 acres at \$2800. the 10 Acres at \$1300., and the 19.49 Acres at \$3600., they would have a total value of \$17,450., which is approximately the same as value of the 110 Acres and the 7½ Acres above mentioned.

If such a division does not find favor with the four children, we will try to make a division of the land into four parts, and then let lots be drawn. We are going on the supposition that when Mr. Milton receives the Blue Springs property, he should have the balance due him either in cash, or notes, as it would

not be practical to set off lands to him of the value of some \$600.

If a meeting can be arranged for all interested, the appraisers would like to meet with them, and discuss the matter, and ~~the~~ get the views of everyone.

Dear Tom:

In regard to your letter of November 4th, I have wanted to make this perfectly plain to you. When I had the points changed and the spark plugs changed and the other work done, the car went dead on me and would not start. I immediately went to your place the second day after I had this work done to see you. You were out. I told your wife that my car would not start and that I would be back and see you.

I came the second time a few days after that for the express purpose of telling you that the work that I had done had not done the job. This was the very reason I asked that the points be changed and the spark plugs changed because my car would not start easily.

Then there was an interim between the time when I made these two trips and I had the work done. I was amazed even that I would receive a bill for such a thing as I had followed this up so definitely. You pay for satisfaction, and I didn't get it, and that was the reason I felt that I should not have even received the bill because I tried to make it plain to your help and to you that the first job did not do the job.

I would much rather have talked to you personally but it seems as if our paths cross very seldom and I don't like a telephone conversation. I would rather put my convictions down in black and white and sign my name, or better still, I would like to talk to you personally, but I am leaving for Coffeyville today and Kansas City tomorrow, and I just haven't had the opportunity to do it sooner. I have had your letter on my desk ever since it arrived, hoping to take care of it, but this is the best I have been able to do.

Your letter dated November 2nd states that you do not feel that the \$2.00 charge made for removing the carburetor October 16th was justified, since we worked on the car September 24th, and did not find the trouble. The \$2.00 will not break either of us so we will forget it. However, do wish to state our case very plainly so you will have no occasion for complaint in the future.

When a customer brings his car to George Wise with trouble such as yours, he checks thoroughly before going into any major work, and has a reputation with our customers for his efforts in trying to save them expense on their car. He is particularly careful with your car due to the numerous letters we have received on bills rendered on work done.

You were charged on the September bill \$2.50 for labor which included installing points, installing condenser, cleaning and adjusting spark plugs and only adjusting the carburetor. When you returned the car in October he found it necessary to remove the carburetor and free up the automatic choke, therefore, the \$2.00 labor charge.

I am sending you a check for \$1.00 for tire inspection and lubrication. The car was entirely unsatisfactory after I had had the spark plugs changed, the new points, and the carburetor cleaned. I immediately came back and told them the car would not start, and although there was a time intervening between the time when the spark plugs and carburetor were cleaned, I made it a point to come back early and state that it was unsatisfactory.

Therefore, I do not feel that I owe this \$2.00 charge. Since the carburetor had been worked on previously, about all that I see that was done was to allow a more copious flow of gas. I made two trips to the garage to inform your people of my difficulty so that I would not be charged for this correction which should have taken place at the first trip. I mailed you on October 4 a check for \$9.07.
