- Section 10. Upon the death of a member of the fund, it shall be the duty of the SECRETARY-TREASURER to make a new call, not exceeding \$ 1.10 for each call so that at all times there will be a sufficient amount on hand to meet death calls.

- Section 12. All Officers of the Fund shall serve without compensation except the Secretary-Treasurer, who shall receive for his services a sum not to exceed two per centum of all monies paid out for benefits, which two per centum shall be paid out of the contingent Fund.
- Section 13. The Executive Committee of this Fund reserve the right to accept or reject any application for membership in the Fund.
 - Section 14. Suspended, expelled or demitted members of Abdallah Temple or members whose current dues are not paid shall lose all rights and benefits in this Benefit Fund.
 - Section 15. The Annual Meeting of this Benefit Fund shall be held at 7:30 o'clock, P.M. on the third Monday of October of each year, at such place as may be designated by the Executive Committee, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to notify each member in good standing in the Fund at least ten days before such annual meeting.
 - Section 16. These By-Laws may be amended, altered or repealed at any annual meeting of this Benefit Fund, upon two-thirds majority of those present. However if at any time during the interval between Annual Meetings it is deemed necessary to alter, amend, or repeal any part of these by-laws, a notice of the meetings to be held for such purpose must be sent each member and the proposed changes be stated in the notice.

ABDALLAH BENEFIT FUND

Proposed By-Laws

- Section 1. This Fund shall be known as the ABDALLAH TEMPLE BENEFIT FUN!
- Section 2. The membership of this Fund shall be composed of voluntary members, who are Shriners in good standing in Abdallah Temple A.A.O.N.M.S.
- Section 3. This organization is separate and apart from Abdallah Temple, and the affairs of the two bodies shall in no way be connected. It is expressly understood that the Temple has no supervision or control over the Benefit Fund, and shall make no expenditure and contract no debts contingent upon their being paid out of monies of the Benefit Fund.
- Section 4. The Officers of this group shall be a President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer, and three Trustees who shall be elected at the Annual Meeting by secret ballot, and who shall constitute the Executive Committee.
- Section 5. Any member of Abdallah Shrine Temple who is under the age of fifty (50) years, and is in good standing in the Temple, and at the time of his application is in good health may make application for membership in the Fund. Said applicant shall file such application blank as may be prescribed giving his age, residence address and his beneficiary. The application must also be accompanied by the sum of two dollars and twenty cents (\$2.20)
- Section 6. Upon the death of a member of this Fund, each member of the Fund shall pay on call the sum of \$1.10; \$1.00 of this amount shall be placed in the death fund, and 10 cents shall be placed in contingent fund to cover postage, printing, clerk hire, services of the Secretary-Treasurer, etc., and such expense shall not exceed amount in contingent fund.
- Section 7. All Calls must be paid within thirty (30) days from the date of call and members of the Fund not paying within that time shall be dropped from the roll and neither he nor his beneficiary or beneficiaries shall be entitled to any benefit from the Fund.
- Section 8. The amount a beneficiary shall receive shall be a sum equivalent to One Dollar for each member of the Fund in good standing on the first day of the month, during which the death of the participating member occurs, provided that the amount of the benefit shall never exceed Five Hundred Dollars. In the event the amount of cash in the Benefit Fund on the first day of any month shall be in excess of \$5,000.00 by an amount sufficient to pay a benefit, the next following benefit shall be paid from such excess and the members notified of such payment. At the death of a member, unpaid dues in Abdallah Temple if there be any shall be deducted from the Benefit.
- Section 9. Immediately upon the advice of the death of a member of the Fund the Secretary-Treasurer shall remit to the beneficiary of the deceased member the amount due as provided above.
