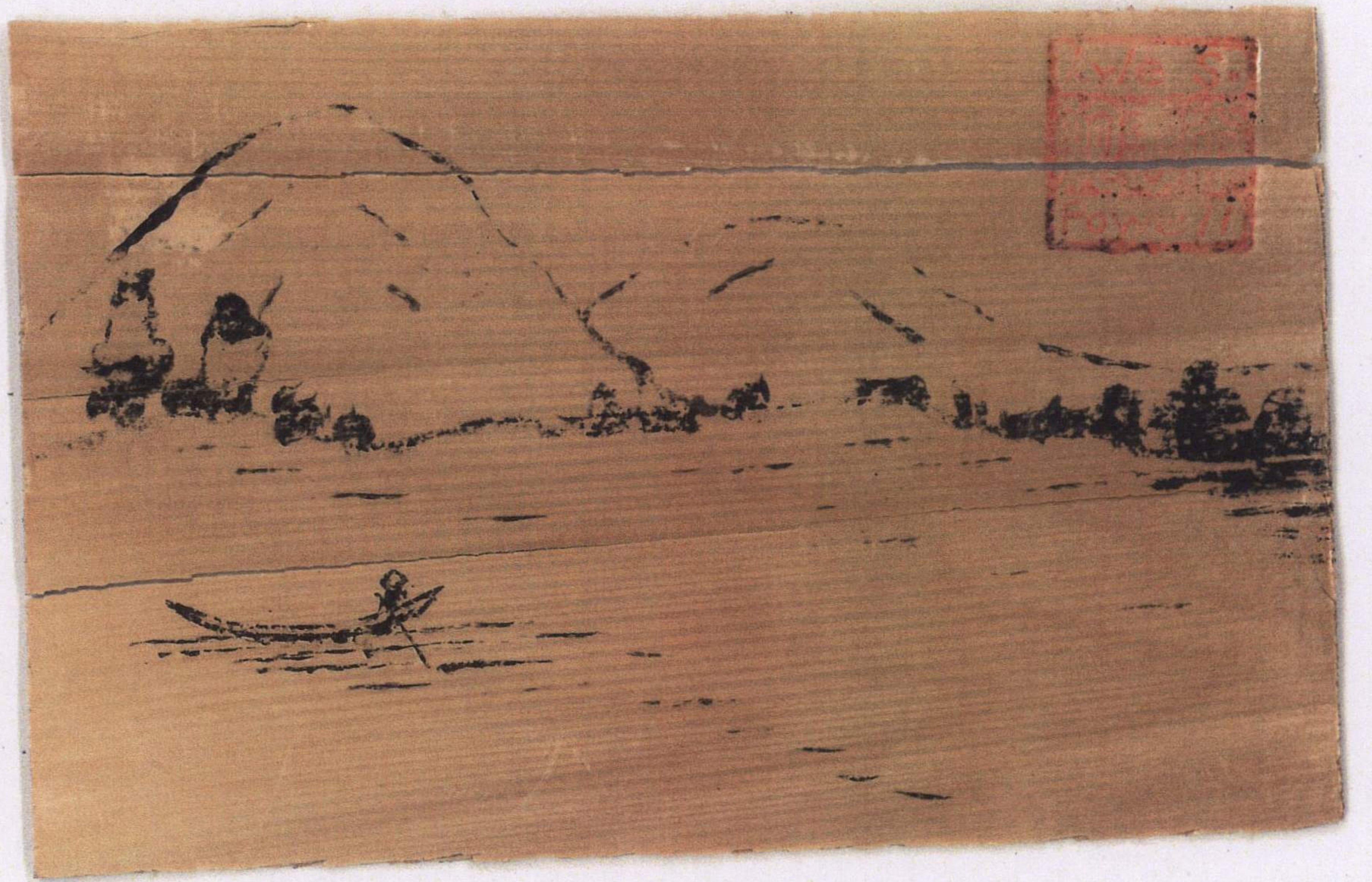

CITATION FOR THE BRONZE STAR MEDAL
(OAK-LEAF CLUSTER)

First Lieutenant John A Pfitsch, 01047728, Coast Artillery Corps, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at ***, France on 23 November 1944. In the early morning hours of 23 November a long range enemy artillery shell struck a truck loaded with 40mm and small arms ammunition setting it ablaze. A nearby gasoline truck caught fire and soon the conflagration threatened to destroy other vehicles parked in the vicinity. Lieutenant Pfitsch at once rushed to the area and drove away two vehicles which were in immediate danger, disregarding the hazards of exploding ammunition and flaming gasoline showered over the terrain by bursting gas cans. Although the heat and smoke was at a maximum, Lieutenant Pfitsch returned to assist in towing away a third truck which had become ignited, and helped to quell the flames. He then posted himself in the danger zone until the fire had been brought under control, making every effort to prevent further damage. Lieutenant Pfitsch's courageous and resourceful actions and his disregard for personal safety reflect credit upon his character as an officer and upon the military service. Entered military service from Texas.

Dear Doc:

It will take the officials some time to learn the signals and get the habit of using them. I have urged them to get into the habit just as quickly as possible. I agree with you that unless they are going to give them it is of little value that the Scorer know them.

I can't answer your question about what the powers of a Commissioner are. They vary according to conferences. I do have ideas as to what they should be. In the Big Six conference the situation at this time is not at all comparable to many other major conferences. As you know my job is the selecting, training and assigning of officials for football and basketball, and any other small detail the conference may assign me to.

The rule on the numbers players must wear is very clear and it is difficult to understand why jerseys would be lettered with numerals that do not meet these specifications. I am sure that if I would write to Fritz Knorr or Mike they would gladly change to numerals that are legal. I would be glad to ask them to make the correction if you care for me to do so. However, unless a situation has direct bearing on the officiating of the game it is not in my province to interfere except to assist in remedying a situation that can best be helped by an outside party.



I have a boy who wrenched his knee making a quick turn in an attempt to block in football last fall. I had it x-rayed by Dr Nelson of Salina. The x-ray did not show anything apparently wrong with the knee but Dr Nelson said he would rather be guilty of over treatment rather than under treatment so he demobilized the leg for three weeks.

The treatment did not bring the desired results because his knee will not give him much support under a strain of a twist or quick turn. Something should be done possibly an operation.

You have had a great deal of experience with boys and their injuries. I remember reading about Ralph Miller who's knee was operated on and was apparently successful.

Would you recommend to me some knee surgeon so that I might refer him to the boy and his parents.

I have been trying since December 24th to write you and thank you for the beautiful tie which you so thoughtfully gave me. Gosh, it is a dandy, and on Sunday morning before I left Kansas City I opened it and wore it down home the day before Christmas. I don't know when I have received a tie that I really liked and enjoyed more.

I also delivered the present to Earl Falkenstien, and I imagine Earl has already written you long before now telling you how much he appreciated the same.

The Kansas colors, crimson and blue, are very dominant, and the gold band in between reminded me of the Kansas Jayhawk on our warmups. I think you must have had an eye to that when you bought it. Again, thanks a million. And do know that I deeply appreciate your thoughtfulness.

We go to Columbia, Missouri, for Friday night's game, leaving here Friday morning at 5:30 over the Santa Fe. 



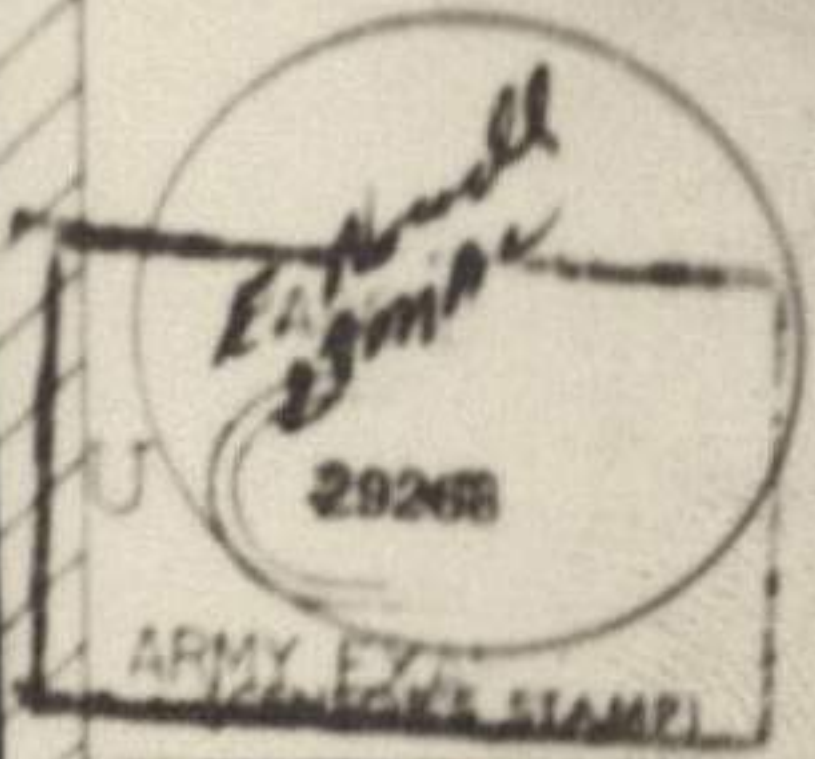
