Release Takes Three Days.

The men arrived Sunday morning from combat service in Germany and Austria, and their release on furlough in the brief time of three days is considered an army record. The men probably will reassemble here and then move to the Oklahoma camp in a group. It has not been announced by the army whether the men will be trained at Luber or how long it will be before they are scheduled to move into the Pacific area.

Weary and begrimed by the 24-hour trip in antiquated railroad coaches, most of the conversation of the men as they neared the end of their trip home was about furlough plans.

Mention of a bonus after the war did not even excite much conversation, most of the men putting it on the basis of "taking what we are offered."

An opponent of a big bonus "because we will have to pay for it ourselves," was Robert Corbett, technician fifth grade, 3423 Wayne ave.

Before he entered the service, he was a teller at the City National and Trust company. He said he had heard a "ruinous bonus" inspired politicians seeking the service-votes.

Kenneth McCann, 21, Butler, said that as soon as possible after he arrived at home he and a woman of Amoret, Mo., were to be married. He said they had planned it by mail and he had
