Undoubtedly this is the youngest team that has ever reported at the University of Kansas. Only Harold "Sparky" McSpadden, formerly of El Dorado, Kansas, and now a chemical engineer, and George Dick, the honor captain of the football team, are the returning members of last year's varsity basketball team. Sparky was a substitute until Armand Dixon was called for his induction, and George Dick, of McLouth, got into but a few games. Sixteen men were recommended for last year's varsity award.
