Meanwhile, the Tigers sharpened their basket eyes and feasted on uncanny scoring sprees throughout the game. Employing chicanery and carefully planned plays, they mercilessly faked the Nebraskans out of position time and time again.

Bill Harvey, as per usual against the Huskers, stole the show.

The pink-cheeked lad led the individual scoring column with 14 points, six of them coming on successive free throws. Clay Cooper conspired with Harvey, in the basket-twins act, and rang up 11 points.

The Tigers connected with 17 shots out of 58 attempts for a 34 per cent average in the Husker triumph.

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
