It was up this noon to 101, but Dr. says there is nothing to be alarmed about- no trouble in the chest, but a "flu" condition.

I have had trouble about his bowels but Dr. has just given me something and hope to have results soon. I feel that when it works, it probably will take the temperature down.

I must hurry to get this off. I will not write you unless there is some significant change in his condition.

Just as soon as we can get rid of this flu- and I realize that is nothing to make light of- perhaps we can get at the foot again. It seems O.K.

Dear Mrs. Quigley and Ern:

I am so happy to hear that Ern is getting along so nicely. He has had a hard fight, but I believe he is well on his way to recovery.

I have averaged about 16 hours a day on my administration and my basketball work, both freshman and varsity. For that reason I believe that since Ern is getting along so well that we will just wait until he improves a little more and have him come in when it is convenient.

I would put that foot in very hot water two or three times a day, and then during each 15 minute immersion I would break every 5 minute period by plunging the foot in a vat of cold water for 30 or 40 seconds, and then back into the hot water. I would get 20 or 30 marbles at the dime store and put them in a corrugated paper box at least 16 inches long, 10 inches deep and about a foot wide, and I would pick those marbles up in my toes, taking them out of the box one at a time and lay them on the rug, and then grasp them again in the toes and put them back in the box. This will get the tendons and ligaments loosened up, as well as the muscles of the foot, and then when we look at it I think we will be able to have you sprinting in jig time.

Frankly, I think that the trouble with the foot was that sacro-iliac strain or sprain. When they stepped on your foot and knocked you back they also wrenched your sacro-iliac and that affected the nerve supply to your foot and leg. That is why it would not heal and that is why it swelled when complications started.

I think the immobility of the foot has been the cause of its stiffening, and not some of the other things that you fear. Of course, as soon as the nerve supply is interfered with the foot would not heal, but now it is well on its way and I think that if you will arrange to come in when you are well and stay around Lawrence for a few days you will make very rapid decided recovery.

Here's wishing both of you a very happy Thanksgiving, with lots of health and cheer. I know that you can feel very thankful for all the blessings that have come to you in your many years



of married life.

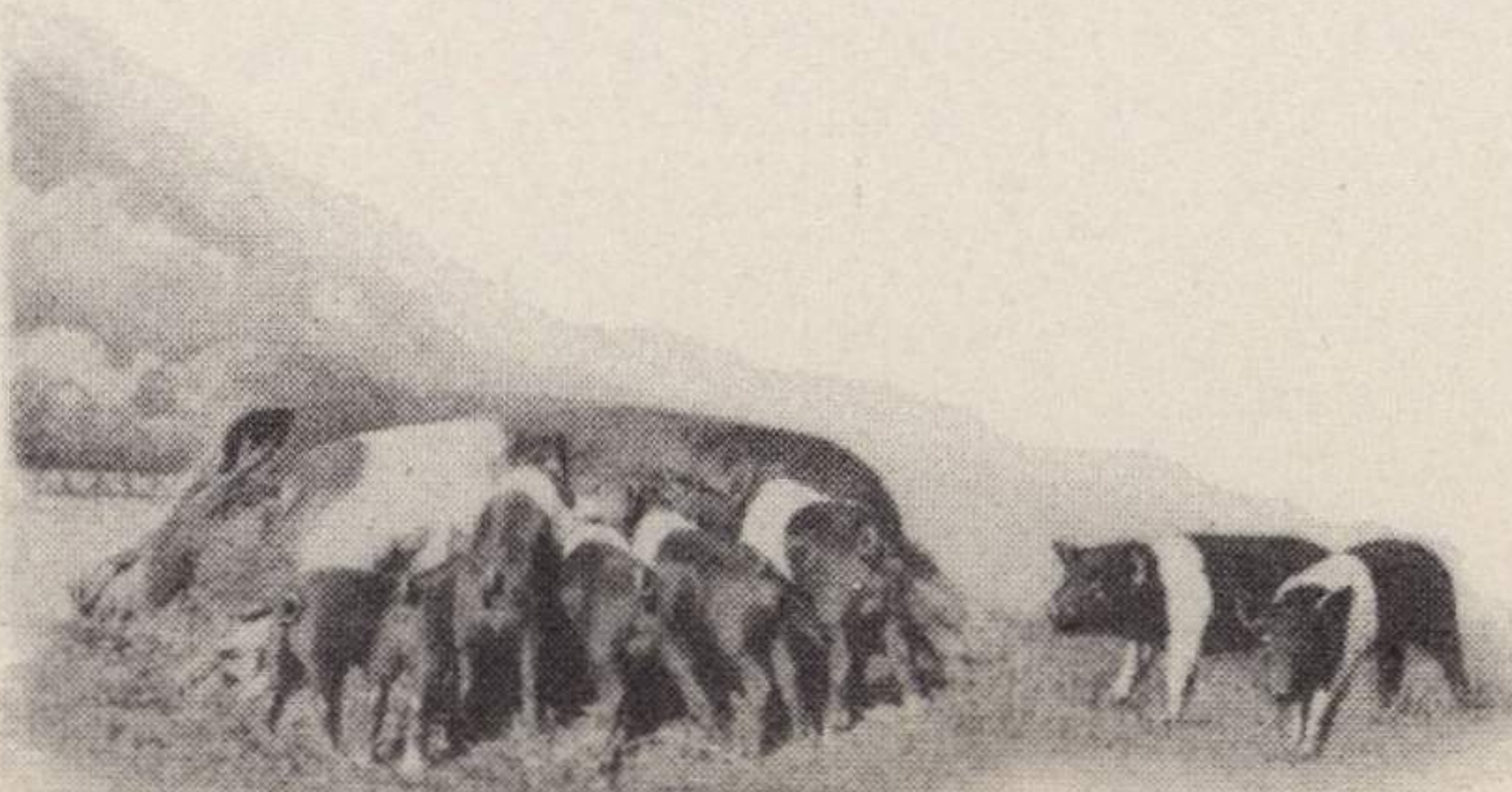

Remained in the Hospital for twelve days and came home the day before Christmas Eve.


The original pictures showed a fracture. We were all working on an incorrect premise that didnt do any good. Regardless of that I want to assure you of my appreciation of what you did for me.

Dear Ernie:

This will acknowledge receipt of your kind letter of the 12th instant with enclosure of check for \$8.00 for my expenses.

I do not know whether you know it or not, but I am called on perhaps fifty times a year to serve my good friends or institutions, and in many instances it is difficult for me to make any collection. I have just adopted the policy of telling schools and different individuals that I have no allowance for that sort of thing, and as much as I dislike it because it grates on my nerves to say it, I have found from necessity that I must do this to keep my budget in balance.

I know that you understand that I would do anything for you that was in my power to do, but I also knew that you and I both have financial problems and families which we must protect. I took your good letter home and read it to Mrs. Allen and my family, and we are all pulling for you a thousand per cent. Mrs. Allen was afraid that I had hurt your feelings, but I told her that you and I had always talked very frankly about things, and I was sure that from one Irishman to another we had understood each other perfectly.

From the description of your case I feel that you still have quite a ways to go before you are entirely well. For that reason, Ernie, take especially good care of yourself. Life would be pretty drab if you were not your old self, and for that reason we are pulling for you to make the grade in high.

Answering your communication about the N.C.A.A. tournament, it will be held in San Francisco, and I think it will be the 17th and 18th of March. That is the play-off for the fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth districts. The place of the eastern tournament has not yet been decided upon, and the final play-off I think will be in Chicago.

We are leaving in the morning for Lincoln, and the way we have been going does not augur well for our chances. We have had a very difficult situation in losing three of our stand-by



officials - you, Pat Mason and Chili Cochrane. In their places we are forced to accept substitutes who are not trained, and, in many cases, they are novices. Officiating is very much different than what it has been heretofore.

I was told.


The swelling became pretty bad and  
Dr. Riley told me that it should be seen by a good  
orthopedic surgeon. We tried to contact Dr. Dixon  
but he was out of town and would not be home until  
the first of the next week. Marg wrote a complete  
history of the case to Dr. Kreuzscher and he called  
me the next night and wanted to see the foot and  
said "Bring those pictures with you". He examined  
me and took several pictures and found that the  
first picture, or pictures, I had taken showed two  
small fractures; that was the 12th of December;

The swelling Dr. Kreuzscher diagnosed  
Lymphatitis and the medication for this was inter-  
muscular injections of iodide and another medicine,  
as tough to take as it is to spell, sulphamillalide.

The cast has been on nearly four  
weeks now and has two more to go.

Looks like there are too many fouls  
in the basket ball games. Kindest regards and best
