Dear Warden Shuttleworth:

I am sorry that I have delayed answering your communication of the 11th instant. My teaching schedule and my game schedule keep me tied up so closely that I do not have time to answer my correspondence.

Answering your question regarding the court, I beg to state that from one basket to the other is a distance of about 90 feet; the end line is four feet back of the basket. There is a center line drawn across the middle court called the division line. For your information I am having a basketball court sketched with the proper dimensions and am enclosing it herewith.

Goals are ten feet from the ground. The diagram will explain all the court markings. There is a new basketball backboard--a lady's fan-shaped modified backboard. I am sending you a picture of one. The old backboard was rectangular in shape, 6' x 4', and the goal was placed one foot from the bottom of this four foot surface.

If there is anything that you do not understand regarding the markings of the court or the goal, I will be happy to have you write me again.

The basketball goal is set six inches from the backboard.


Dear Sir:-


Dear Doc:


Dear Laretta:

My statement sounds paradoxical I know, but I have been so tired of seeing those little fellows matched against those altitudenous giants on the opposition that it really hurt me to see the amount of energy that they would expend to arrive at a victory or near victory. And then they were so afraid for the games coming up.

Howard Engleman, Bobby Allen and T.P. Hunter, 3 boys weighing but 157 pounds against those opponents really made me feel as if I was torturing them, and yet they wanted to play and it was the best we had under the conditions. 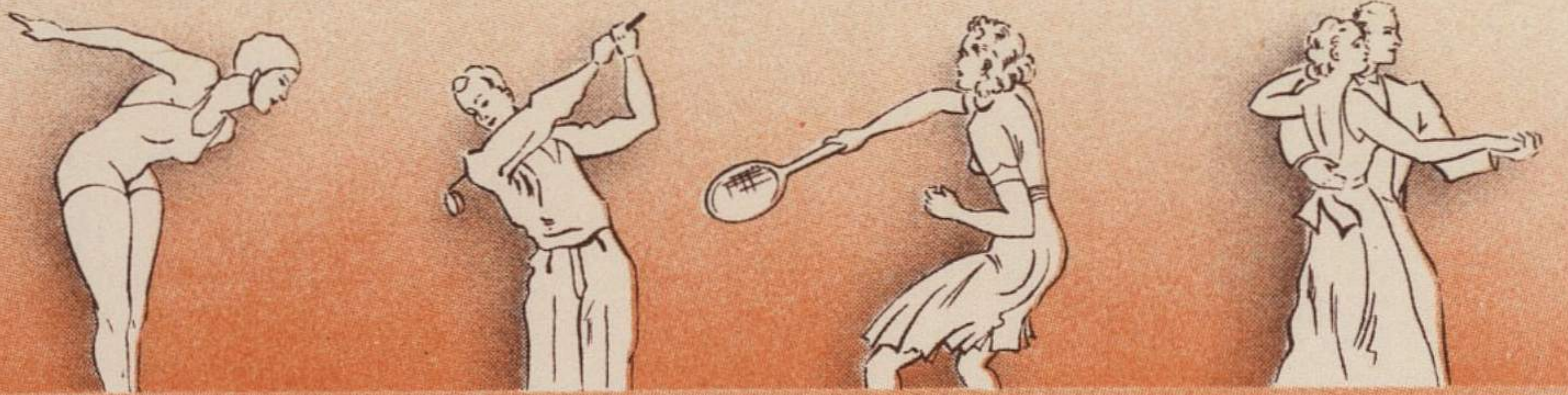
I took your letter home and read it to Mrs. Allen and both of us highly agreed that you two were especially kind to write the letter of commiseration and good wishes.

Mr. Simons and I wish to congratulate you & the basket-ball team on a very successful season -

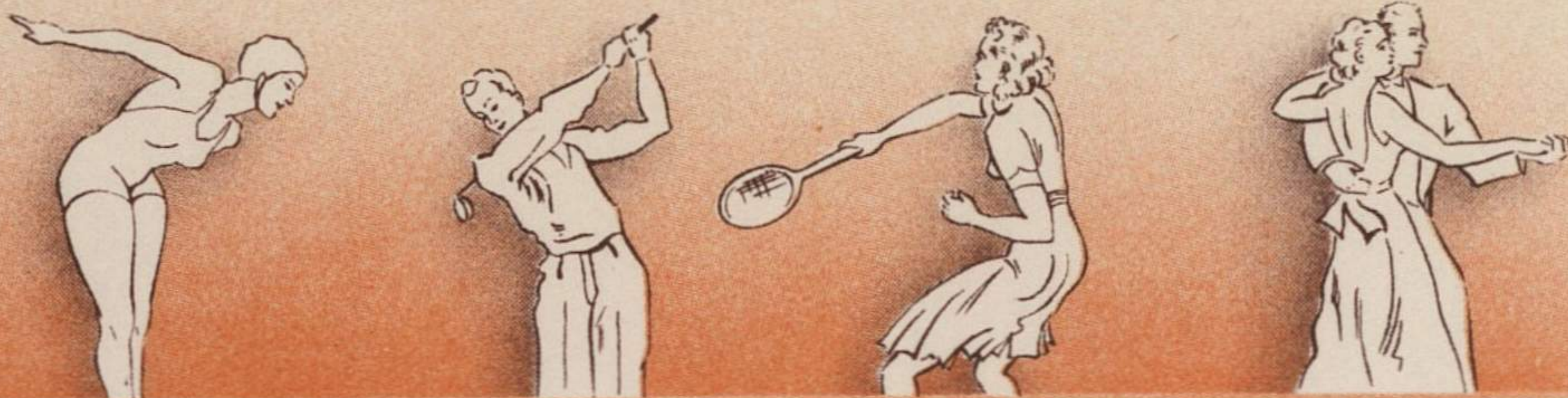
We regret of course that you did not win the championship, but you have made a fine record and I am rather glad that the boys are not having to go through those hard tournament games.

While it was rather disappointing to me at the time, I really believe it was better that I was not elected to fill the vacancy in Salina last fall. I have many advantages here which I would not find in Salina - The facilities for physical education are so much more desirable here, I am working with older girls which I prefer, there is an opportunity to organize and build up a new department, the work is not so strenuous physically, and last but
