

However, I am taking the liberty of pointing out to you the facts as they exist in the hope that the objection can be overcome. These games are to be played at the 132nd Regiment Armory in the City of Chicago. This Armory has been used, and is being used by DePaul University as their home auditorium. They have played the University of Purdue at this Armory for the last two or three seasons, and they conduct all of their games there when their own auditorium can not accommodate the public. This situation does not exist in New York City in that the Madison Square Garden is never used by any of the participants as a home floor during the regular playing season. Your very good letter of the 29th ultimo has been received.

Personally, I do not see how you could hope to enter college with no funds or means of assistance except your experience and ability to work. I am sending you a carbon copy of a letter that I some times write to boys who expect the couch or athletic director to obtain jobs for them.

I have always stated that if a boy had \$100 or \$150 to pay his tuition, and enough to allow for a rainy day, that he could perhaps make it, but it is asking a good deal of people for a boy to expect that some one will take enough interest in him to see him through where the entire benefit redounds to the student. Every right-thinking man wants to help a boy help himself, but I do not know how you can start to school without funds, and expect to make it.

Perhaps you have not stated your whole case. Do you mean that you have no funds other than for tuition and books? Every student is forced to pay tuition, and unless your credit at your home bank or with some of the people who believe in you is worth \$100 or \$150, I would not advise you to attempt such a procedure, because the course is not for one year but for four and you would find yourself in more of a dilemm the second year than you would the first.
