Dear Mr. Teetor:

Thank you very much for your good letter of the 24th. I quite agree with you that the affirmative could be strengthened if we include a few case reports. I had these in my first draft, but removed them thinking that in my position here as director of physical education and being a member of the Big Six Conference that it would be like throwing mud at your own family.

Now I will mention some of these to you, but I would not want to mention names because that creates ill will and recrimination. You, having seen Major Griffith's article, could be in a better position than I to put in the things that you desire to make both articles tie up. Why would it not be best for you, as you have my permission to do so, to write the things that you think this article needs, and when you have finished it you send me a page proof and I will o.k. it.

Now the things that I am saying to you in confidence and off the record and not for publication are some things that I know have happened in several conferences.

A few years ago the University of Kentucky diverted \$10,000 from the athletic association for advertising, and this sum was for the purpose of hiring athletes at \$90.00 a month. This \$90.00 a month salary went to both football and basketball players. I have this from Adolph Rupp, who is basketball coach at the University of Kentucky. Rupp was a member of my 1923 ever-victorious basketball team here at the University of Kansas.

I also have definite knowledge that there is an assistant athletic director whose school is a member of the Big Ten Conference, and that school is located in Chicago, and this assistant athletic director is the man who takes care of monetary arrangements for the boys who attend this institution. This fellow pays the necessary expenditures of these boys, whether they live in a hotel or other places, and he cracks down on them if they do not do what he desires so far as their getting eligible and their training methods are concerned. The football coach and athletic director, of course, know nothing about it, but you and I both know that they both know.
