Dear President Andrews:

As chairman of the Program Committee for the present year, I desire to make a report for the period November 3 to January 12, inclusive.

On November 3 we held a Recognition and Appreciation Day for Dr. A. J. Anderson, paying tribute to a generous soul for his years of wonderful devotion and service. He has administered for years to the people of his community, many of whom were unable to pay for his services. The love and devotion the people of Lawrence have for Dr. Anderson make him the outstanding character in Rotary.

On November 10th Dean George B. Smith, of the School of Education of the University of Kansas, electrified the club by his brilliant and provocative discussion on "Why is Education a Controversial Topic?".

On November 17th Warden M. F. Amerine, of the Kansas State Penitentiary, spoke on "A Program for the Kansas State Prison", and had the members staying a half hour after adjournment time. He was so sane and logical, and yet progressive, that the members considered this one of the outstanding meetings of the year.

On November 24th the Reverend L. H. Griffith, chairman of the Board of Douglass County Commissioners, spoke on "The Business of Douglas County". He made a fine contribution which was greatly appreciated by the members. The speaker was introduced by Dolph Simons in the absence of your chairman of the program committee.

On December 1st Dr. Lyle S. Powell had charge of the program, bringing over from Ft. Leavenworth Lt. Col. C. A. Edson, who gave us exactly what we needed when we were seeking information on national defense.



December 8th. The Club met at the University for this meeting. Wonderful food was served at the Memorial Union Building by Miss Hermina Zipple, and a snappy, peppy, challenging dissertation was given by Chancellor Deane W. Malott. The singing by Professor Joe Wilkins, Miss Irene Peabody and Professor Allen Crafton added greatly to the program. The meeting adjourned with the members saying the food was the best ever, the Kansas Room was the ideal environment to enjoy the tasty food, and that Chancellor Malott was tops on top of Mount Oread. He gave a graphic speech on the great momentum that the University is undergoing at the present time in building and aiding in national defense.

On December 15th everybody sang Christmas songs and brought presents which went to the little tots of the day nursery. All Rotarians were kids again, exchanging presents.

December 22. Rotary is blessed with two stalwarts who have been in business and professional work for fifty years - Dr. A. J. Anderson and W. C. "Collie" Simons. On this day there was a large sign saying "Congratulations, Collie", and appropriate remarks were made by members pointing out the distinguished and valuable service that he has rendered to his community. He was presented with a toy wheelbarrow as a symbol of construction and upbuilding combined with hard work. He was told that this vehicle was symbolic of the fact that a man with his sleeves rolled up to catch hold of it. W. C. Simons is a man who was never afraid to take hold of things. The club gave him a great ovation.

On December 29th, Frank L. Brittain in his talk on "Let's Save America's Business" took man from his early beginning and traced him to the present time showing that the main business of America is Americanism and democracy. He made a delightful 20-minute presentation, showing that the democracies always live and dictators always fall.

On January 5th Professor H. B. Chubb thrilled the members with his talk on "The Outlook in the Pacific". His talk was so full of vital facts of the present emergency that he had everyone mentally on his toes. The members were steeped with the consciousness that these facts were coming from someone in authority.

On January 12th J. Willard Ridings, director of publicity at Texas Christian University, spoke on "Publicizing a Big Time Football Team". He made a host of friends by his clever, intelligent and friendly dissertation. He will be here again year after next when T.C.U. plays at Kansas. At that time



he will be "beating the drums". Mr. Ridings was accompanied by his son, Paul, of Midland College, Fremont, Nebraska. They form the only father-son combination to hold master's degrees from the School of Journalism of the University of Missouri, and the only father-son combination of college publicity directors in the world.

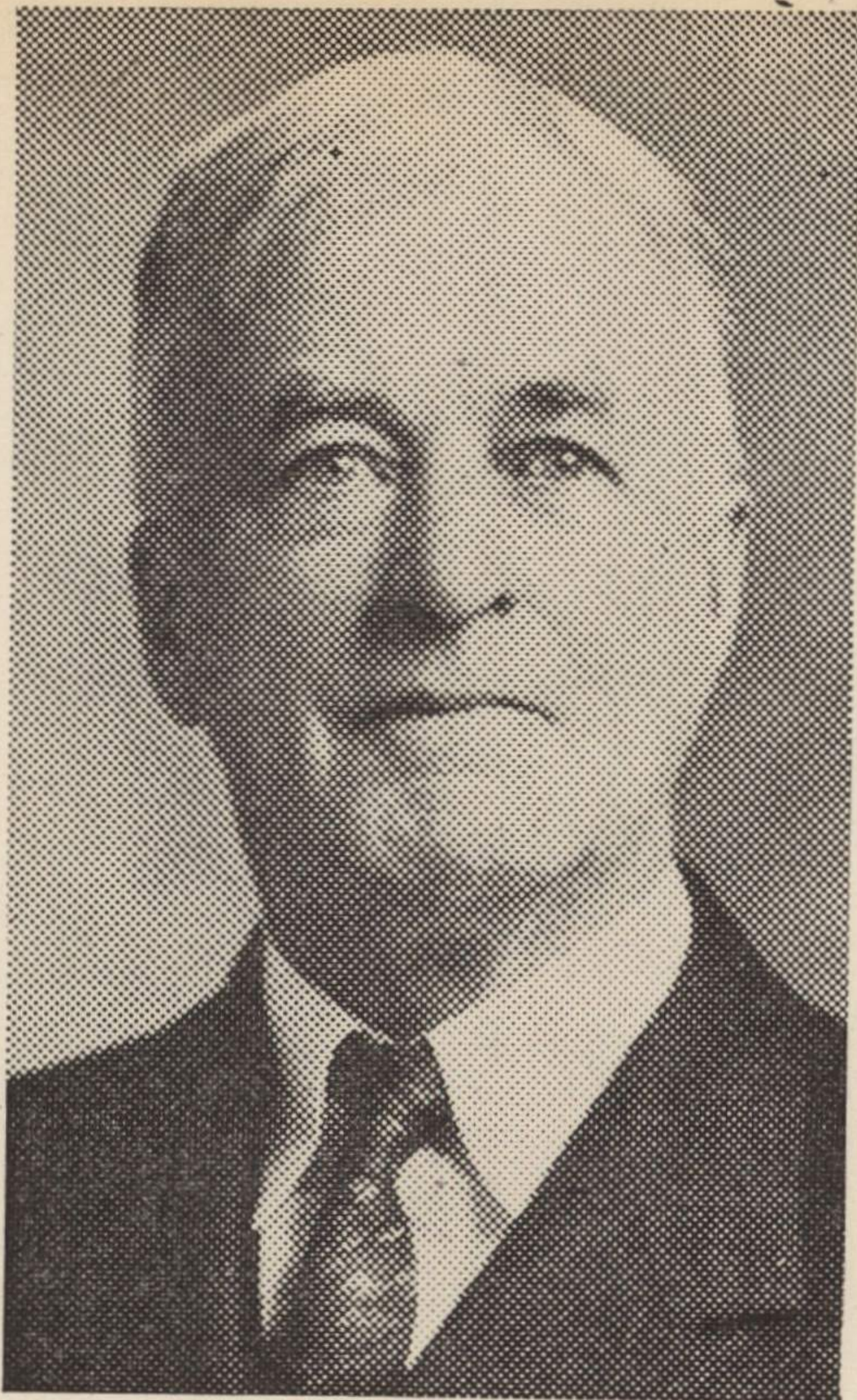

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS:

SIX MONTHS HAVE PASSED since we landed in U. S. A., from China. Six busy months spent largely in travel, interpreting Far Eastern situations to individuals, clubs and conferences, reaching representatives of perhaps a thousand churches.

OUR SON RICHARD IS STILL IN CHINA; his wife and four children are in Lawrence, Kansas. Richard has found much important work to do as a missionary in Peiping. The separation of the family during these days has been a very hard experience but all concerned are willing to pay the price. No word has come recently from Richard but we assume that he and other Americans are interned there in Japan-controlled China.

WAR WITH JAPAN has been the inevitable outcome of the attitude and policy of Japan for many years. Believing, as Japan does, that Heaven has decreed that it is the destiny of Japan to rule the world, the conflict with the West was sure to come. The start of the war was ideal; the Pearl Harbor tragedy produced a united America ready to put everything into the struggle.

VICTORY IS SURE FOR US and our Allies. A new and better world is in the making. It will not be long before peace-loving, generous China will be free to develop her country and become the dominant nation in the Far East. "Get thee behind me, Satan," were words spoken by our Lord when men tried to persuade him to turn aside from the path to the cross. Today it is for our America to take up the cross and go out to save the world. Thank God for our wise leaders who in recent years have sensed the world situation and have prepared to help save the world from Hitler and Japan.

TO MAKE THE NEW FREE CHINA a Christian nation is the task and opportunity of the Christian Church. Mrs. Hanson and I are eager to return to China as soon as peace comes. We do not want to go with empty hands. Our church should see to it that ample funds are available to meet the needs and to make possible a Forward Movement greater than ever before. In our Shantung Annual Conference it must be possible for us to do the following:

1. Put every trained Chinese Christian worker into active service preaching the Gospel. Shortage of funds in recent years has made it neces-



sary to drop workers, and many more men and women must be prepared for Christian leadership.

2. Quickly re-open our great Academy for boys and girls and develop many primary school feeders. The Japanese forced the closing of much of our school work.

3. Make our medical work more effective, both in preventive and healing activities. The nearest hospital to ours is 50 miles away.

N.B. We are glad to report that a good friend has agreed to give \$5000 for the erection of a wing to our hospital at Taian for a women's ward.

4. A hundred or more little church buildings should be erected where the Christian communities will co-operate generously in providing proper places for worship.

5. Provide some endowment for the medical and educational work so that the poor may be cared for as well as those who can pay.

HAVE YOU MADE YOUR WILL? What about writing in something for Christian work abroad! It may be that you will want us to invest for you in the wonderful Shantung Province of China. You may write to us regarding this matter, or, if you prefer, take it up with the Board of Missions.

OUR UNUSUAL FAMILY deserves a paragraph. Unusual in number, seven children, seven grand-children, five 'in-laws'. Our seven children have had 123 years of education, two higher degrees in Social Science and two in Theology. Eleanor is in Kansas, Richard is in China, Ada Ruth and Hobart are in Vermont, Margaret is in Cleveland, Elizabeth is in Philadelphia and Perry Jr. is in New York City. We thank God daily for the wonderful blessing of good and loyal, loving children.

Mrs. Hanson and I have improved greatly in health and strength since coming from China in June. The hard experiences of the four years of bombing and "occupation" and living under the Japanese invaders had taken their toll. Life in this wonderful land of America brings a healing, renewing power that has meant much to us both.

FORTUNATELY, OUR TRAINED CHINESE men and women workers are right now, even in the absence of Missionaries, carrying on much of the work in our Shantung Conference under the direction of Bishop Kaung. Their task is exceedingly difficult because of the presence of the Japanese and with guerilla forces nearby. It is distinctly a time when Christian workers in China must "be wise as serpents and harmless as doves." Some of the preachers and teachers have been in prison and have been beaten and even tortured, some have lost all their possessions. Your brothers and sisters in our Shantung Conference and other parts of "occupied China" are showing themselves to be worthy to "follow in their train." The least that we Christians in America can do is to provide the funds needed by those faithful representatives of ours--and yours.

LETTERS FROM MANY OF YOU have come to cheer us. Better still, we have seen a large number of those who will receive this letter. We look forward to many more letters, visits and your financial co-operation before our return to China. We pray daily that conditions may soon change for the better and make possible the return of all missionaries to their fields of service.
