
Dear Phog:

Born in Nokomis, Illinois, and as a lad came to Kansas with my parents where we settled on a farm in Morris County.

Commencing in my 'teens, taught school six terms in Morris County, the last two terms being as principal of the Council Grove high-school.

Took my college work in Teachers' College, Emporia, and Baker University.

Engaged in the newspaper business in 1898 and published the Council Grove Guard for twenty-three years. Changed this weekly to a small country daily in 1914.

Served in the lower house of the Kansas Legislature in 1909 under Governor Stubbs.

Later was Pardon and Parole Clerk under Governor Stubbs.

Was appointed by Governor Stubbs to be Superintendent of the State Reformatory at Hutchinson in 1910, serving three years.

In 1921 was appointed Warden of the State Penitentiary by Governor Allen.

Sold my newspaper interests in 1923.

Passed the wardens' examination in Federal prison service in 1931, serving seven and one-half years as Warden of a small Federal Prison in New Orleans.

Returned to Kansas at the request of Governor Ratner to take charge of the Kansas State Prison in May, 1939.

In August, 1905, married Miss Mable Chilcott, who was then publishing a country weekly in Louisville, Kansas.

We have four children, three of whom followed journalism and two are in that work at this time. M.F. Amrine, Jr., is at this time handling publicity for the OPM in Kansas City. His twin sister, Abbie Arnold Amrine, is at this time handling the society page for the Kansas City Journal.

At this time I have served about eighteen and one-half years in penal institution work.




Dear Mr. Andrews:

In spring 1939 I won a scholarship at Baker University, Baldwin, Kansas, while studying at Charles University in Prague, Czechoslovakia. The Germans occupied the country before I could leave and it took me almost one year before I succeeded to come to the United States. I am now studying at Baker and financing my studies chiefly by lecturing. Since summer 1940 I spoke for eighty four groups in Kansas: churches, service clubs- Rotary at Ottawa, Burlingame, Kiwanis at El Dorado, Kansas City, Lions at Newton - chambers of commerce and schools.

I want to ask you if you could use me as a speaker in your club some time. My theme would be "Why I like Amerika". I am contrasting the situation in Czechoslovakia during the republic build upon the American pattern - the Czechs were called the Yankees of Europe - and the "New Order" during the Nazi occupation. I would also briefly mention how I came over, why I like it here so well and give a little survey of the present European situation which I am following closely. I would talk about 30 min. with a question period if desired. and for a fee of \$10.00.

I would appreciate your attention and kind consideration of my request.

Dear Fellow Retarians:

In our Retary program for Monday noon, which is our Recognition and Appreciation Day of Retary and Retarians, I am outlining rather sketchily our procedure. Naturally it must be elastic to make it informal, and not to expose our purposes to A. J. and other Retarians until the significance of the thing gradually seeps through.

Hog waits until everybody is finished before he obtains his speaker. Now, here is what I would like to have - I'd like to have W. W. Davis give us a speech with our meal. What do you say?"

And of course President John will perhaps turn to me and I will say, "Go ahead and have speeches with your meals. It's O.K. by me. I just work here you know." And that is the cue for W. W. and he will have one of those choice tall tales that he always tells which he means is absolutely true.



We can treat the next speaker in an important fashion.
