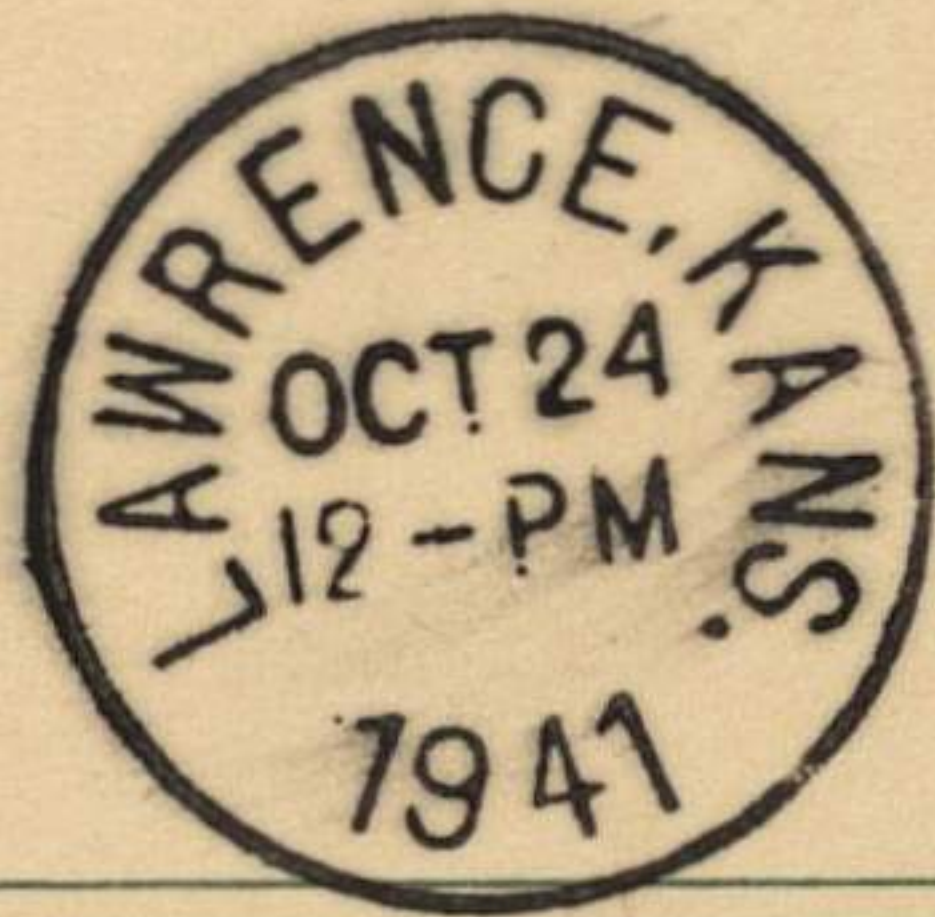




Dr. Allen

Dear President Andrews:

As chairman of the program committee for the present year I desire to make a report. Our purpose in arranging these programs was, first, to stimulate good fellowship among the members; secondly, to have the program entertaining; and third, to obtain speakers who would challenge the members or benefit them by their presence.

On July 7th we had the program, "Change Your Place at Each Course". When the members first sat down they had their cocktails and then after the cocktail each individual had to get up and change places, carrying his napkin and his glass with him. When the next course was finished this same procedure was followed. Then they changed again for the dessert. This type of program stimulated contact and conversation.

The North Carolina a cappella choir from Greenville, North Carolina, stopped at the Eldridge Hotel and we were pleased to have Lewis S. Bullock, the director of the choir, render Rotary Club one of the most entertaining fifteen minutes of music and song that they have enjoyed for years.

On July 14th the assembly of directors and committees took up the entire meeting time.

On July 21 we inaugurated a "How Come" program, thanks to the suggestion of Gerald Hesse. We wanted to know from each one of the members where they were born, what their father did, some incidents in their early school life, where they went to school, when and where they were married, and how come they are in the business or profession that they are now in; also how come they are in Lawrence and in the Rotary Club. We put the names of the members in a box and had a lottery, using the visiting Rotarians to draw the names. The first name spoke last, if there was any time left. The second name spoke secondly, and the third name drawn spoke first.

There was to be no preparation and the individual was to get on his feet as his name was called. This innovation caused quite a commotion in Rotary. We found some members hiking out as soon as their meal was finished. They got the buck. We soon discovered the identity of these members and put the pressure on them to prepare their talk so they would be ready to be called upon. This

program ran through each week beginning July 21 through September 15, just prior to the opening of the University. The following men spoke about the early incidents and the important happenings of their lives. I know of nothing that stimulated as much good will and interest in the club as this program has done. The personnel has changed over a period of years and we found some men not actually knowing much about the other fellow. This brought the whole membership up to date.

On September 22nd the film of the Denver convention was shown, and Neal Cherry and President John Andrews took over and made the event a memorable one.

On September 29th Captain Brigen of the Salvation Army obtained Colonel DeBevoise for the speaker. He was most interesting. He is a Frenchman who was born in Toronto and was converted there after a debauch of a week. He straightened up and is one of the outstanding men in the Salvation Army, besides being a talented speaker.

On October 6th the meeting of all meetings took place. President John Andrews, working with Hovey Hanna who is chairman of the Rotary Ann meeting, provided for one of the most colorful settings for this fine party which was held at the Crystal Room of the Eldridge Hotel. Michael D. Kononis, Greek consul and attorney at law in Kansas City, delighted the Rotary Ann and the Rotarians with one of the most fervent patriotic talks that the club has listened to in years. Hovey did everything perfectly right, and John Andrews recited "Breathes there a man with soul so dead", after which the group sang "America the Beautiful". Sidney Dawson, a colored boy in the School of Fine Arts, sang negro spirituals.

On October 13th Honorable Fred H. Harris, chairman of the Board of Regents, delivered a masterful address on the business of the Board of Regents.

On October 20th Walter Vanum, who is past president of the State Pharmaceutical Society, obtained Dr. Bowers of the School of Pharmacy, who gave us a very enlightening address on "The Educational Requirements for a Pharmacist".

On November 3rd we will have Recommendation and Appreciation Day of Rotary and Rotarians.

On November 10th Dean George Smith, of the School of Education, will speak.

On November 17th Vardon Anorine of the State Penitentiary will address the club.

On November 24th Rev. L. H. Griffith, chairman of the County Commissioners, will speak on the business of the county commissioners.

We are withholding December 1 for a date rather expectantly. We are endeavoring to have Rev. Perry O. Hansen, missionary to Tainan Shantung, China, on that date. He is on a furlough here.

On December 8th we will be the guests of Chancellor Deane W. Malott, of the University. The Rotarians will eat at the University cafeteria and then make a short inspection tour of some of the interesting buildings on the campus that the Chancellor may select.

We have desired to have Dr. Powell, who is chairman of the international relations committee, select one of the early dates, but due to conflicts we have not been able to schedule his talk on our calendar. We expect to have two or three meetings during the year stressing international aspects. The November 3rd date was Dr. Powell's, but it was necessary for him to cancel it. We have his tentatively listed for January 12 or 19.

We have sprinkled through the year other meetings such as Dr. Ray Q. Brewster, head of the Chemistry Department at the University, who will speak on "Chemical Aspects of the Sulfanilamide Problem"; on February 16th George Staples, magician, under the guidance of Neal Wherry, will present the program. About April 6th we will have Dr. Powell again, and on April 27th "Boys and Girls Week" will be observed at the high school. Neal Wherry has asked for this.

We are having a lot of fun doing this and we trust that the members are deriving some pleasure and some benefit from this program.

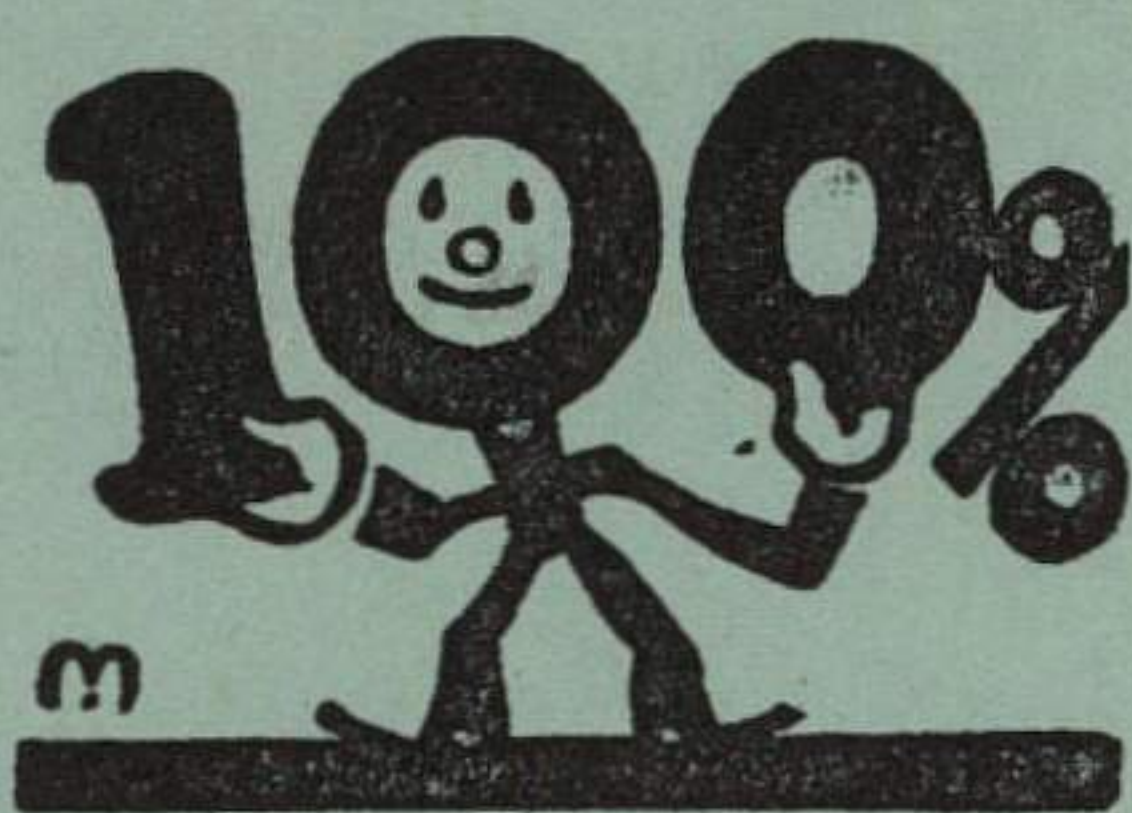

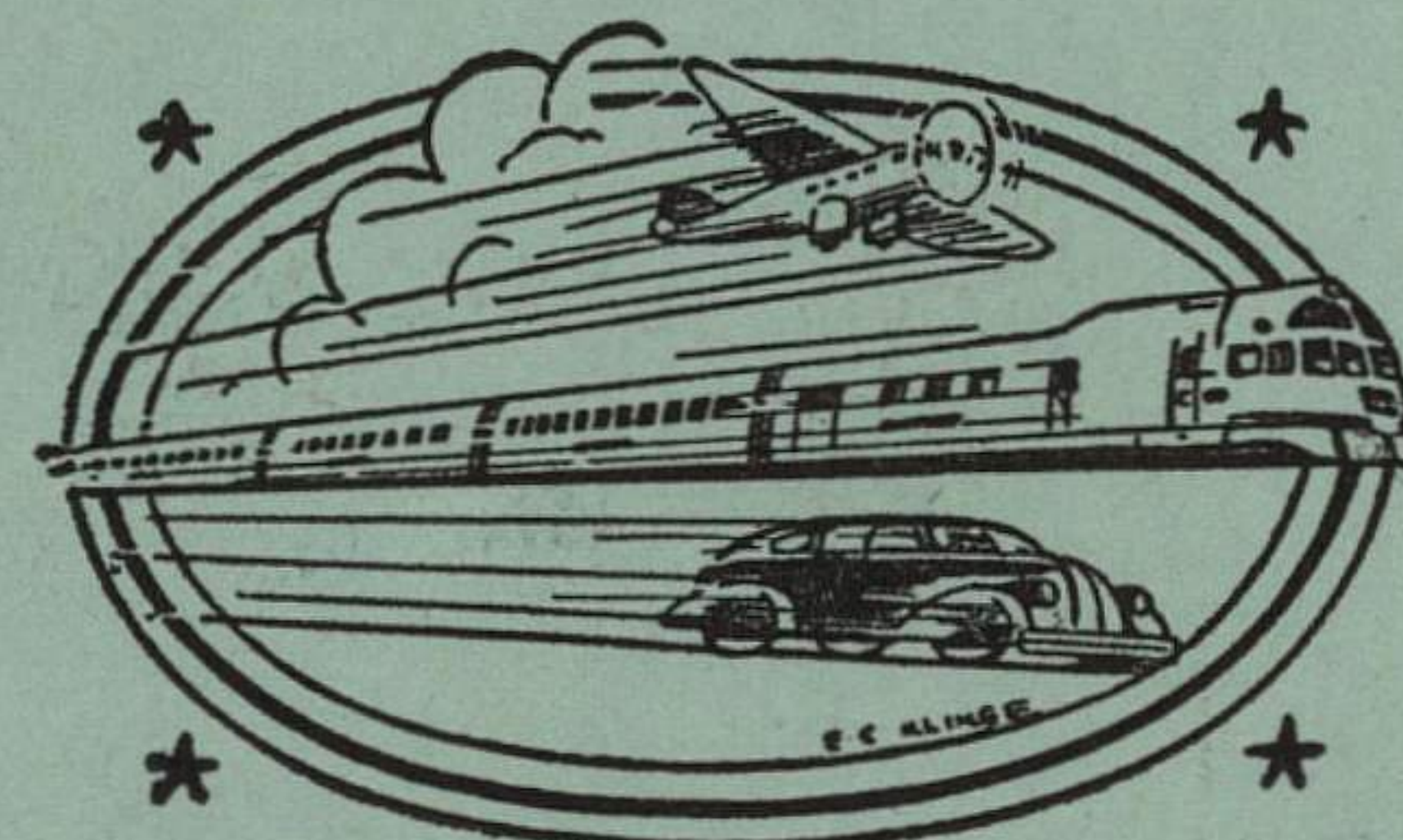
Normal Living

Of course many of our normal activities will have to be curtailed. We will have to do without many things. There are many things we cannot do. At the same time, it will be well for us to remain sane enough to continue many of the ordinary activities with which we have filled our lives.

To assume that we have to change everything in order to be patriotic is foolish. In that direction lies hysteria and nervous collapse. We will have to release the tension by forgetting the load sometimes.

It will not be a sign of indifference to the national crisis if now and then one follows some form of recreation or even spends a little money for pleasure. Someone will be sure to say that you had better have spent that on defense bonds, but you will do well by the defense program if sometimes you insist that your life must retain some of the normal things of former days.—The Roto-graph, Brookville, Ohio.
