




•Crop conditions have greatly improved in the southwest part of the state, where wind storms were making serious inroads and giving rise to reports that the socalled "dust bowl" was on its way back. Crop prospects are now f favorable, further supported by f the fact that a tremendous acreage of summer fallow wheat is more than promising. The moisture extended well to the east and t south, and since the eastern portion of the state has had an adequate supply all winter, soil conditions are excellent. Probably 50 per cent of the oats crop has been planted, and preparations for other crops are underway. Only Yeakel the northwest is deficient in mois-Newman ture at this time, although other western sections will soon need more to maintain the present crop Wyatt outlook.
