After other expense, such as that for referees has been paid, and the state association has received a small percentage to cover overhead expense of conducting the association affairs, if there is any revenue left, the teams entered are entitled to share with the state association in the division of what might be termed "profit" on the tournament.

Perhaps the price of admission is too high. But many tournaments do not pay out. Experience here has been that Lindley Hall is usually just about packed for the final games, anyway.

Nevertheless and regardless of other considerations, the fact remains that the state association officials fix the admission rates and direct all matters pertaining to tournament finances.
