
Dear Mr. Allen,

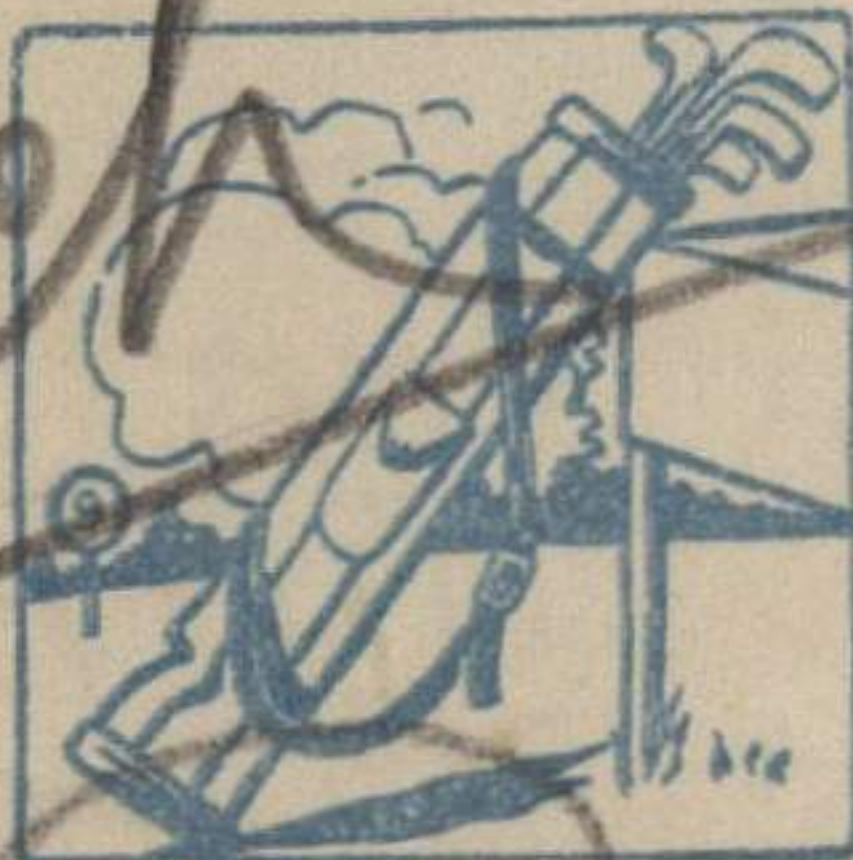
