Dear Doc:

About a year ago I wrote you a letter concerning some other matters and at the same time mentioned Kenneth Wulfmeyers name.. This boy was very highly recommended and in your return letter you said that you were definitely interested in him and that I should sell him K.U.

In case you have forgotten I shall briefly review Kenneth's high school basketball career. He made the All-City four years in a row. At the same time he was selected three yeras on the All-District team. He has carried weak teams into championships and has always been the leading scorer. While his all-round ability in basketball is superb he is a wonderful leader and shows wonderful head work on the floor. His coach uses a shifting man to man defense. I have seen him direct and guide green men on the court in such am manner that would enable them to do a preety fair job of guarding their men when ordinarily they would have been lost. He would make you a marvelous "quarterback".

I have heard college coaches rave about him including such men as Henry Iba and other Missouri-Valley coaches. He is the first boy that I have ever heard of Edwards of Moissour being interested in enough to write. I saw a letter from Edwards through the assistant principal to Kenny saying that he would get a job for the boys this summerk in St. Louis for \$85.00 to \$100.00 a month.

Dear Ken:

I am answering your good letter of July 21st and I'm also inclosing a Physical Education Bulletin for your information.

Doubtless you have received the University Catalogue. I called the Registrar's Office day before yesterday and asked that they send you one at your street address in St. Louis.

I have been so busily engrossed with my teaching and my recreation work this year that I have had too little time for correspondence. Our recreation work is at night, also, here at the University under lights. So, with early morning and late night work I find difficulty in making all my proper connections. I'm sorry that I have not been more prompt in writing.

You state that your work on the playgrounds close on Labor Day. You come right on up and we will put you to work the day you arrive. I would suggest that you bring some old clothes with you because they will come in handy. I will put you outside on the tennis courts, golf links, etc. until your school work starts. After that, it will be inside work in the towel room or in some work connected with our Physical Education Program.

You will be able to get in at least eight and one-half hours a day every day that you are here until school starts. I'm very glad for you to write and for you to ask questions about which you aren't sure of. You depend on me to give you all the aid possible and I want you to feel free enough to come to me with every one of your problems. I find that when a boy is anxious enough to get straightened out on these minor details, that he is interested in his work and generally makes the type of fellow whom we are all proud.

We welcome you to Kansas and we look forward with pleasure to your coming. I would suggest that you send your transcript to Mr. James K. Hitt, Assistant Registrar, University of Kansas, telling him that you desire to enroll, etc., and that you are sending it for his inspection. Of course, you will call your Principal or the secretary of the High School and ask them to mail your transcript to Kansas University as you intend to attend school here. The form is made up at your High School and they will not turn it over to you but will mail it direct to Mr. Hitt.

I note that Coach George Edwards dropped in to see you and had a visit with your family. George is a fine man and a good coach and I know that he disliked to lose you to me. Fine things have been said about your character and your playing ability.
