
Dear "Lew":

Dear Mr. Peterson;

The matter of your enrolling here at the University of Kansas has just been brought to my attention. On account of your status, when you do enroll, being that of a transfer student, I am taking the liberty of enclosing a copy of Article Eleven, (II), of the Eligibility code which is a part of the Rules and Regulations governing athletics in the "Big" Six Conference.

My purpose in calling your attention to this section of the code is to preclude any embarrassment to either you or the University of Kansas and also to protect you in the matter of your further intercollegiate competition.

In re; The matter of your competing in Intercollegiate athletics if you do transfer to Kansas University: (Quoting from the letter before me and address to you.)

"You would, of course, under conference rules not be eligible until you had completed two semesters of twenty-four hours," (End of quote)

This information would be correct under normal conditions but, as of right now, you are eligible to compete in Intercollegiate athletics, as an undergraduate, at any college providing you have completed at least twelve (12), hours in each of the two preceding semesters, which your transcript evidences that you have done. Fact of the matter is that you have an excess of hours.

Please advise me definitely concerning this matter and I quote from the enclosed Article twelve; "may participate he shall establish beyond reasonable doubt that his migration had no undue connection with athletic participation. When an athlete considers transferring to another institution he shall communicate with the authorities of the institution in which he proposes to enroll, pointing out the reasons for such transfer,"; (End of quote)

Please understand me that I am interested to the extent that I may appear quite inquisitive.

RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING ATHLETICS
AND ALL PARTICIPATION OF THE

M. V. I. A. A.

XI. MIGRANT ATHLETES. Before a migrant athlete from an institution above high school grade, except from a strictly organized junior college, may participate he shall establish beyond reasonable doubt that his migration had no undue connection with athletic participation. When an athlete considers transferring to another institution he shall communicate with the authorities of the institution in which he proposes to enroll, pointing out the reason or reasons for such transfer, whereupon it shall be the duty of the authorities of such institution, if a member of this conference, to ascertain through correspondence the validity of the reason or reasons for such transfer. Failure on the part of the migrant athlete, or on the part of the institution, to comply with the provision of this section shall render such migrant athlete ineligible for further athletic participation in this conference.





Hank says that KVOO have been coming in to even these small games at Stillwater and broadcasting all of them even at a loss. Frankly, he doesn't want either station charged anything because they have built up his crowds until they had 8000 at the Oklahoma Aggie-Oklahoma game at Stillwater.

Dear Mr. Quigley:

Through a space of several years I have endeavored by the written and spoken word to bring to the attention of the legally constituted authorities, namely the college presidents, that something be done about the observance of the rules printed in their handbook for the guidance of our athletic people.

Practically every rule in the Missouri Valley (Big Six) handbook is being violated. And the sad part about it is that the ones who violate the most rules are the most successful in winning games and championships. It is synonymous with Hitler's invasion of the Ruhr. None of the Allied Nations stepped forth to stop it, and the Hitlerian conquest went on.

To go blithely along in a fool's paradise by observing every one of these rules seems to spell failure for men who follow the code. Therefore, I am writing you this date this letter to be never used unless at some time in the future it is to show that I recognize this situation and in the event of none of the schools in the Big Six doing anything about it, then merely to inform you that some of the practices of our neighbors may be followed by us in so-called legitimately attracting superior students with athletic ability to our campus.

To the Coach Addressed:

At the meeting of the Faculty Representatives of the Big Six Conference held at Lincoln, May 19, 1944, the following eligibility requirements for participation in intercollegiate athletics for the duration of the war or until permission is withdrawn by conference action shall be as follows: (as applied to undergraduates)

1. That he is a regular bona fide matriculant.
2. That he is enrolled regularly in 12 semester or term hours.
3. That in order to participate during the second semester or term he shall have completed 12 semester or term hours the previous semester or quarter.
4. That in order to participate during a third or other subsequent term or semester he shall have completed 24 semester or term hours in the two preceding semesters or quarters.
5. That no athlete shall be awarded a letter except after he shall have completed 12 hours in the semester or quarter in which he participated.
6. That all prior rules and regulations in conflict with this regulation are hereby to be repealed.

The above requirements were amended by the addition of the following provisions:

1. Due to the difference in interpretation of present eligibility requirements, conference members will be given one semester or term following the opening of the 1944-45 school year in which to conform to the rules of the original motion.
2. That all new students must conform to these rules immediately.

#2 - To Coaches

3. That no professionals, graduates, or students who have completed normal collegiate competition are eligible when enrolled either as civilians or as members of Armed Force units. This section is effective immediately.

I would thank you to go over these requirements carefully and govern yourselves accordingly.
