

I have said and done everything in keeping with the traditions and the real work of the University of Kansas. I shall not lower her standards to meet the apparent type of competition that's being placed before some boy.

If Hoyt desires to attend the University of Kansas, we'll do everything we can for him legitimately and keep with the best ideals of a splendid institution. And, if he choses some other institution, he will do so with my blessing.

I appreciate your whoehearted interest, but you and I both know that if you want money, you go to a bank; if you want pills, you go to a drug store, and if you want education, you go to a first-class educational institution.
