



I received your special delivery letter and when it arrived I could not see how in the world I could negotiate a job that would pay Reid to come in and take a chance. However, things have developed now that I believe we can put Reid to work at 35¢ an hour, 8 hours a day, and I will make it last as long as I possibly can. I realize the situation that he is in and will do everything in my power to help him.

It will be necessary for Reid to have some money to pay his actual expenses until the payroll is signed and his check is forthcoming. The payroll is signed between the 23rd and 27th of each month, and the checks are received the 10th of the following month. 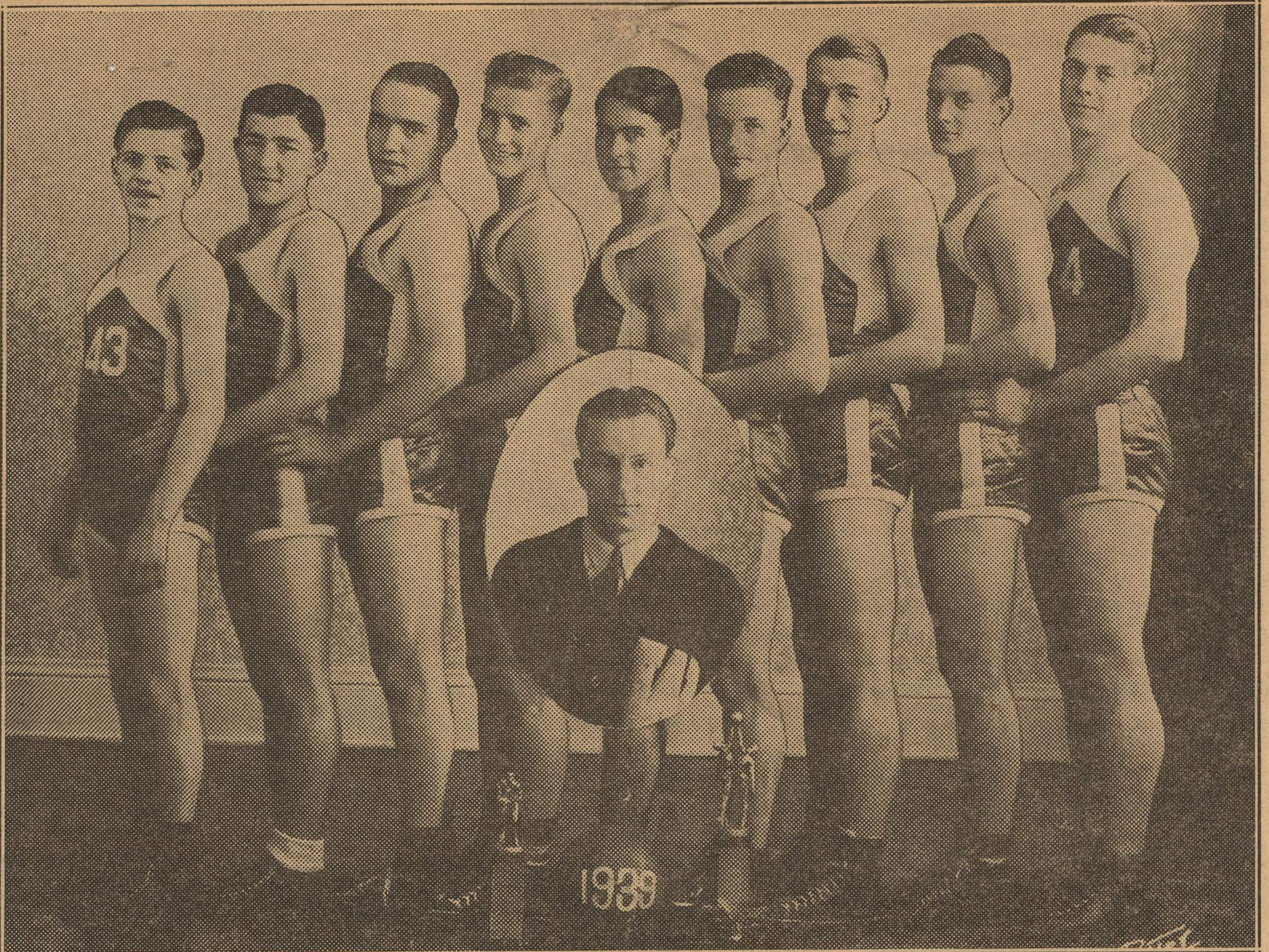

So far as I can see at the present I expect to be in town during the Kansas Relays. Last year I was down at Atlanta, Georgia, attending the National Health and Physical Education meeting and missed many of the boys who came to town.

I know how difficult finances are, and if I were you I would not penalize myself by going to this expense, even though I would very much like to see the boys. Many times a group of boys get together and hitchhike or arrange for a ride without much expense to them, and perhaps these boys might do it. We will have a lot of people coming from Oklahoma City, and if you do not come it might be that they could negotiate some sort of a trip up and they could be entertained while here at some of the fraternity houses.

At any rate, I want you to know that I appreciate your interest, and if you can come up it will be swell. I know Grady Skillern very well and know the fine reputation he has in turning out good teams.

We have had a lot of tough luck with our basketball team this year. The key man, Miller, of course being on one leg cuts down our efficiency a lot. But if we can get by the Aggie game tonight and the Iowa State game Monday night we will be better for the second semester. But I fear that I am

going to have plenty of trouble with these two games as Miller is not nearly well, and those teams are both tough this year. With the semester coming on the rest that we will get during the vacation will do Miller's knee a lot of good. However, we have been forced to play six games in sixteen days, just at a time when we are lowest in our efficiency scale.

But we shouldn't cry because we have had our share of victories over the years, and it is about time for some of these boys to get even with us. We will be in there next year with a hustling ball club and we will be a lot better off than we are this year.

Paul got eight points against Classen and added nine against El Reno to bring his total for seven games to 52. Red made 10 points in the two contests to keep a 9-point margin over Heap. Taylor Burton, little forward, is in third position with Shelly Green, starting guard, fourth.

The Braves' offensive record took a dip as they went under 30 points in both victories. However, their season's record for offense is 30.7 per game and the opposition has counted only 21 per game.
