Dear Vern:

Thank you for your interesting letter of June 25. I am glad to know that you have a job during the harvest season, and hope that you will find steady employment throughout the summer.

Your fees for the first semester would be approximately something like this: matriculation fee, \$10 (this is paid but once); incidental fee, \$25; health fee, \$5; activity fee, \$6. This would be \$46, and does not include any laboratory fees nor cost for books.

Our jobs here in the towel room pay 35¢ an hour, and about the most a boy could earn at that job would be a maximum of \$20.00 a month. If you have saved enough money for your books, tuition and incidental expenses, then I am sure you will have no difficulty in making the grade here at K. U. However, I tell the boys that the first thing they must do is get their studies. That is the reason you come to the University - to get an education. If a boy has to do too much outside work to make expenses, that detracts from his academic work.

I assure you we will help you help yourself in any way possible, and if you have further questions it will be a pleasure for me to hear from you again.
