Harold, I believe the only new angle that I think of would be the inter-sectional aspect of basketball and the sectional games the Big Six teams played; for instance, Missouri and Oklahoma played in the Garden, and in this N.C.A.A. championship tournament we met Southern California and Rice and Indiana, and so forth. So truly this N.C.A.A. championship is nationalizing basketball in an exceptional manner. The game is getting keener, and a coach to win now must use both the man for man and zone interchangeable, and he must use both the fast break and the set plays as indicated.

I am sending you, confidentially, a letter from Floyd Rowe, who is chairman of the Basketball Rules Committee, and assistant superintendent of schools at Cleveland, Ohio. He did some of his expert charting while sitting in the balcony in a special reserved seat at the final game with Indiana. Indiana was sizzling hot and they passed the ball much more rapidly than our teams do here. But as far as possession was concerned, our Big Six entry, although beaten, by a decisive score, does not look so bad on the face of everything concerned. I thought this might prove interesting to you.
