In view of the fact that it is at this time impossible to get pullman service from Kansas City to Columbia, Missouri and return for the basketball team, which would necessitate the basketball squad being up all night Tuesday night and all night Wednesday night after playing the game at Columbia Wednesday night, I have discussed with Mr. Klooz the possibility of allowing you .Ola per man per mile for the use of your car and one other, whomever you designate, and the University Ford.

The round trip railroad fare from Lawrence to Columbia is \$7.98, making a total cost of \$95.76 for chair car fare. By using the University Ford and two other cars the cost can be held to \$68.25, which is allowing for the ten basketball men, coach and trainer, and driver of one other car. This, of course, is including the University Ford.

The exception is being made for this one trip only and is not to be taken as a new precedent as far as the payment of mileage for the use of private cars is concerned.

Dear Director Henry:

Due to compulsory physical education for 1800 men students of the University, our baskstball practice period has been badly disclosated. It is not now possible for our boys to practice Honday, Wednesday and Friday afternooms due to the physical conditioning program. After they out their meal at home we cannot affect to inchilge in streamous baskstball practice until one hour at least has elapsed after their meal. The introductal program for men is upon us with a heavy demand for the grammium space every evening hour. Therefore, I am submitting to you a program of our broken practice periods, and I am making a recommendation that an allowance be made for a small expenditure to pay for meals that they cannot eat at home on account of these conflicts.

On Honday, Wednesday and Friday the physical conditioning courses run from 8:30 in the morning until 5:20 in the afternoon. The earliest that we can get on the floor on these days is 5:20 or 5:30. On Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday afternoons we can have our former regular practice period, 5:30.

The boys at their organisation houses eat in the evening at 6:15, and some at 6:30. The earliest that we can practice without injury to them after a meal would be at 7:50. A two-hour practice would bring it to 9:30, and by the time the boys shower and get home it is after 10 o'clock. This is too late to get much studying done and I fear their grades will suffer.

Therefore, I would like to ask that a simple meal be served them after their Monday, Wednesday and Friday practice. We could start after 5, get through at 7, eat at 7:30, then the boys could go to their studies and get a good Evening's work done. I have talked to Miss Zipple and she is unable to serve us because her cook leaves at 7 o'clock or before. I have shopped around, and the Jayhank Cafe at 14th and Ohio Street has made us an offer of 60¢ a meal for a small steak dinner. I have estimated the maximum number of mem. We have at present 22, but I figure before long it may be down to 20, and maybe to 16. Figuring a maximum of 20, this would be \$36.00 a week, or \$144.00 per menth, and three months at the outside would be \$432.00.

Figuring the times when we would be playing games away and also the Mastern trip when we would be away, we would out this down to \$350.00 for the three menths. This may seem quite a sum, but always during the Christmas vacation when the boys return for practice the meals have always been paid for by the Athletic Association. So after all, this would be only an added expenditure of scarothing better than \$200.00 ever last year's budget. It is my recommendation that this be done for the boys. Since the football boys had a training table, and a maximum of \$1,000 annyally was allocated for this purpose, it seems to me that our basketball earnings each year of ever \$5,000 would justify that. I believe we will make this amount again this year.

In running over the names of the men that I have trained I recall James Cox at Harvard, Roland Logan at West Point, Milton Kelley at the University of Texas, Elwyn Dees at the University of Nebraska, and Dean Hesmith at the University of Hansas. For the last few years I have not trained anyone, nor am I now training any trainers to do this type of work.

Does draws \$2600 at Nebraska, Cox and Logan draw more, and I am sure that Kelley's salary is well up as a trainer. I notice that Ollie Devictor at Missouri was raised from \$2500 to \$2600 at Columbia the other night.

You and I both realise that Dean Nesmith is underpaid considering the work that he does. I count him as one of the most valuable members of our staff here at the University. He is clean, he is loyal, he is a great friend of the boys, and he is as good a trainer as I have developed. Therefore, in the name of fairness to the lower bracket group, I feel that he should have careful consideration for a possible raise. He is raising a small family and is doing an heroic job on a little money.

You will pardon me for calling this to your attention but I feel so vitally that if we try to replace him you will go over \$2000 to do so. I have not spoken to Dean Nesmith concerning this. I am doing it on my own volition.
