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Pralle was the high individual scorer with 45 goals and 31 free throws for 121 points. Pralle improved his free throwing throughout his career at Kansas and in his senior year he was the sparkplug of the team that wasn't supposed to be going anywhere in particular. In his three years of competition Pralle played in 62 games, including five of the Olympic preliminaries and regional finals and 30 conference games. In all he made 207 goals, 125 free throws for a total of 539 points. He missed 73 free shots, making his free throwing percentage .63.

but Kansas scored only 40.8 points per game to Oklahoma's average of 45.6 ^{overall} the Jayhawkers held their opponents to 32.9, the lowest in the conference and therefore had an offense ratio of 1.24. Meaning that Kansas scored 1.24 points to each point scored by opponents. Oklahoma's opponents also scored ^{nearly as well} ^{as} ^{Okla.} cutting the offense ^{ratio} of the Sooners to 1.13.

There were no changes in coaching personnel. Harold Browne coached at Nebraska, Hugh McDermott at Oklahoma, George Edwards at Missouri, Frank Root at Kansas State and Louis Menze at Iowa State.

The only change in the 1938-39 coaching known at this writing will be at Oklahoma where Bruce Drake succeeds Hugh McDermott, who has moved into the school of physical education.

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
