This will confirm our telephone conversation of this morning. I immediately called Horace Mason, our publicity director here at the University, and yesterday afternoon he mailed voluminous publicity data with pictures to you at Chicago Stadium. Doubtless it has arrived by this time.

I noticed what you and Mr. Morse said, and to date Horace Mason has received no communication from Mr. Morse or from you. However, he is sending the scoring data pronto. I am quite amazed at your failure to receive the publicity material as Mr. Mason is very punctual and very prompt. He is a demon on statistics, and if there is anything else that you want if you will communicate with him he will get it to you.

Ralph Miller, Ray Evans, and Don Ettinger were all three stars on the backfield for Kansas last year, and I have asked Horace Mason to elaborate upon their football playing efficiency as an aid to your publicity program.
