#1 Cal defense

Offense

The 3 Cal front line men "cupped" around our floor guard who had the ball. The Cal guards covered the first 2 men thru as long as they were in 20 to 25 feet of the basket. If our f's crossed the Cal. guards switched men. This front line defense played more of an intercepting game. Hardly ever did a front line



man go back and earn  
an extra offensive man.  
The Cal front line was very  
good at intercepting the ball -  
but easy to draw out of position.  
The C. guards are very  
aggressive and at times  
even more than that.

### Cal Offense

Their quick break was  
their best offense - as many  
as 4 men taking part in  
the drive. Coffield is quick  
and loses no time starting  
down the floor when he  
takes it away from the  
offense. They go down in  
a 3-lane rush proposi-  
tion with Coffield trailing.  
As long as I had a man



covering Caffield closely  
 he wasn't much good -  
 but as soon as Caffield  
 is allowed any freedom  
 he is good.

The Cal slow offense  
 is usually criss-cross  
 passing to the front  
 line and from there  
 they seem to have no  
 regular method of attack.

The 3 offensive men &  
 Caffield break in & out  
 of the defense but  
 apparently get no place  
 by this method. When  
 they see they can't get  
 in for a close shot  
 then they shoot long &  
 3 men fall hard.



They are very good at this. They spend a lot of time on the practice of following shots & stopping the ball in.

This year's team has had no publicity but I understand they are working out under Howvair. Their line-up looks like Weber & Granger for - Ten Egghe c - McCoy & Coffield guards. Weber played some last year & is about like Stevens, in fact I think he is a better floor man but not as good a shot. Granger is a tall skinny boy

who is a very good side court shot. He is not a good floor man and not a good def. man. Ten Eycke played a before he went out for forward - but he isn't the player in any respect that Corbin was. Ten Eycke is easily rattled & gets sore easily. Mike used to bench him for this reason. He would be easier to draw out of position than Corbin.

Coffield is good if you allow him to be. Chase guarding when his team has the ball & he goes wild.

McCoy is not much  
of a shot but is a good  
rough guard. He is  
about the size of Cox.

Dear Phog:

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of October 15th in which we discuss the California basketball team. I am enclosing a little dope that I wrote out in longhand that may be of some value to you.

The California assistant coach is having practice regularly five days a week at California. I understand that several of the boys who were out for football a year ago, and who are also basketball players, did not go out for the football this year but are working regularly on basketball. This will put them in much better shape for early season games than they were a year ago. In spite of this hard work, it is the general opinion around these parts that California will not be as strong as last year. To begin with they haven't a man on the squad who would be able to pull the team together once it started on the down grade. Corbin besides being an excellent player was also a fine leader and one who could pull the boys together if things were not going right. California has not been able to do a thing against a shifting zone defense. Last year I witnessed their games against St. Ignatius and Santa Clara and in neither of these games was California able to do a thing against these defenses. Incidentally California was beaten badly in both of these games. The opponent in each case used a delayed offense with forwards in the corners and a big, tall center in the middle. This seemed to open up the California defense to the state of allowing the passes to come in to either the forwards or the center and the return pass for a shot. California cannot play a slow deliberate game. Their game is a hard, driving attack and unless they play this way they cannot hope to win.

This week is our most important game of the season, against Southern California. "Pop" is busy with the boys trying to whip them into shape for a winner.

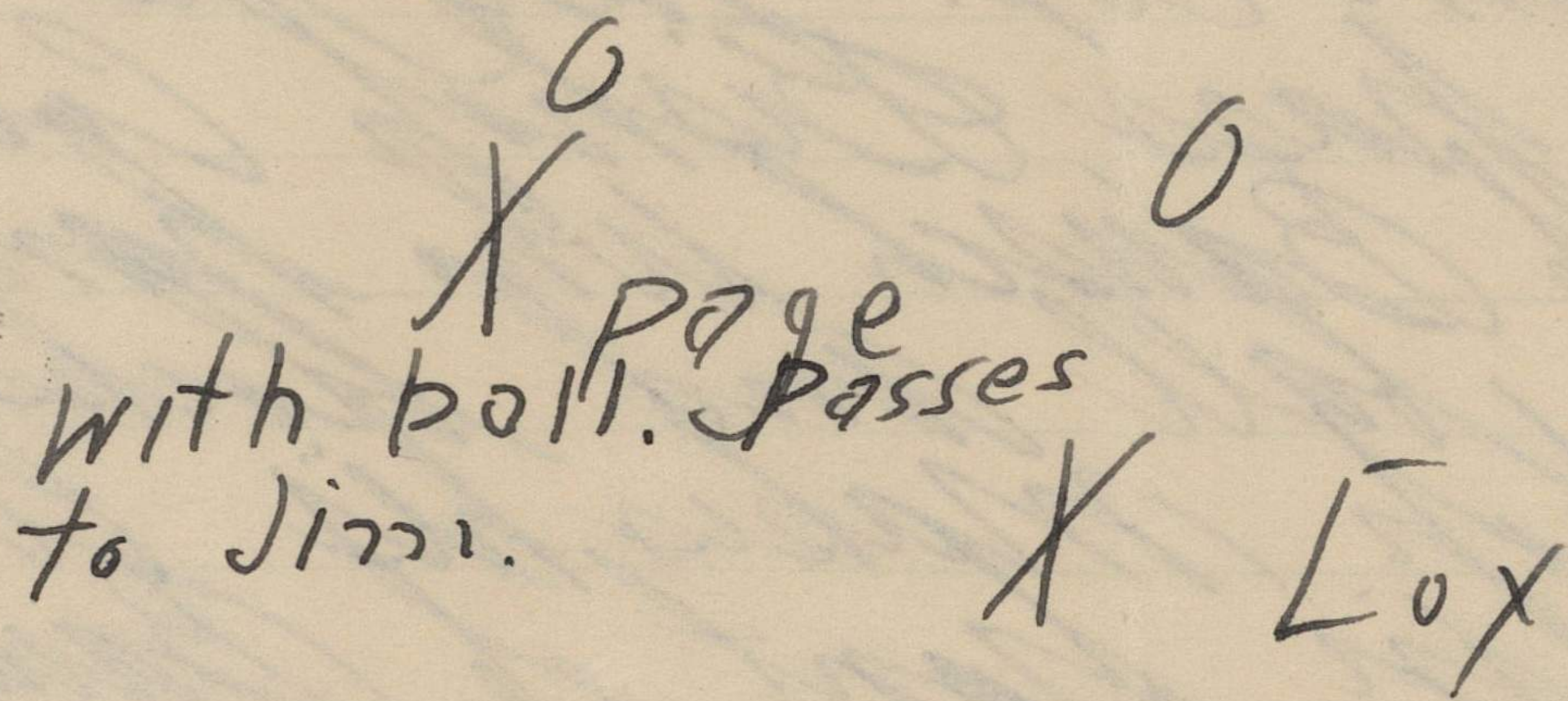
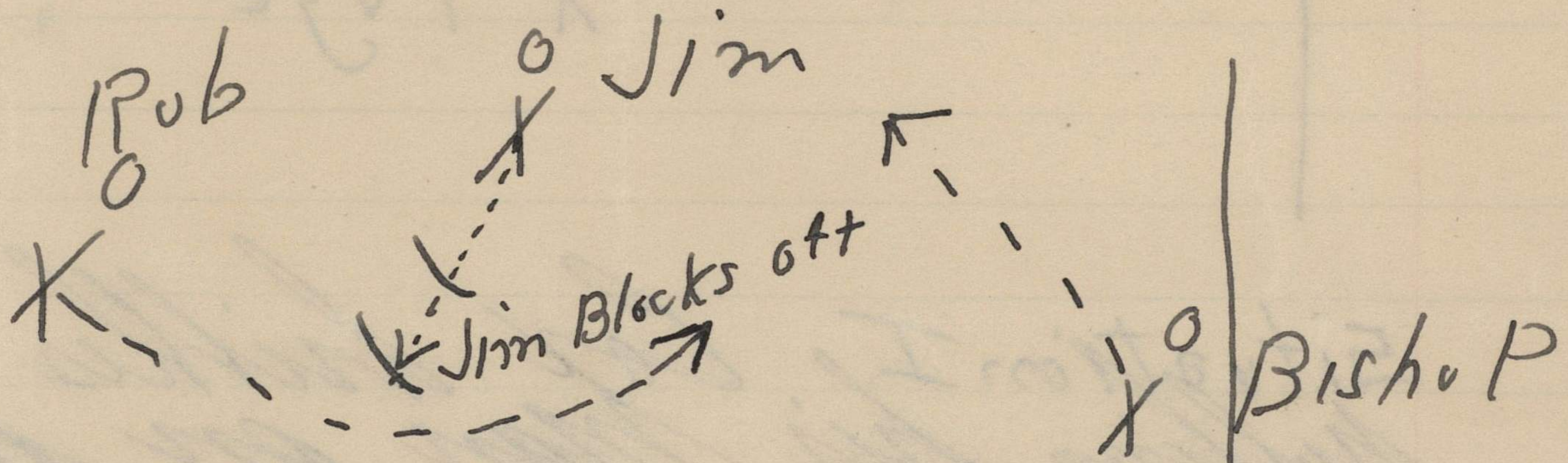
Situation I. Cox dribbles to side pulling his man on him - Bausch comes out taking a hook pass from Cox. Just as Bausch receives pass Bishop cuts in front of Bausch who hands him the ball and blocks off. As Bishop makes his dribble he cuts in front of Bausch. Rub cuts straight in for the basket trying to get ahead of his guard. Bishop is left open for shot. The result of this works the same way only Page dribbles in on his side and Rub does the cutting in front of Bausch.



If the forward who cuts in front  
 of Brusch is not open, he  
 ahead of his guard, Brusch  
 will take the ball and wait  
 for one of the guards to cut  
 in front of him.

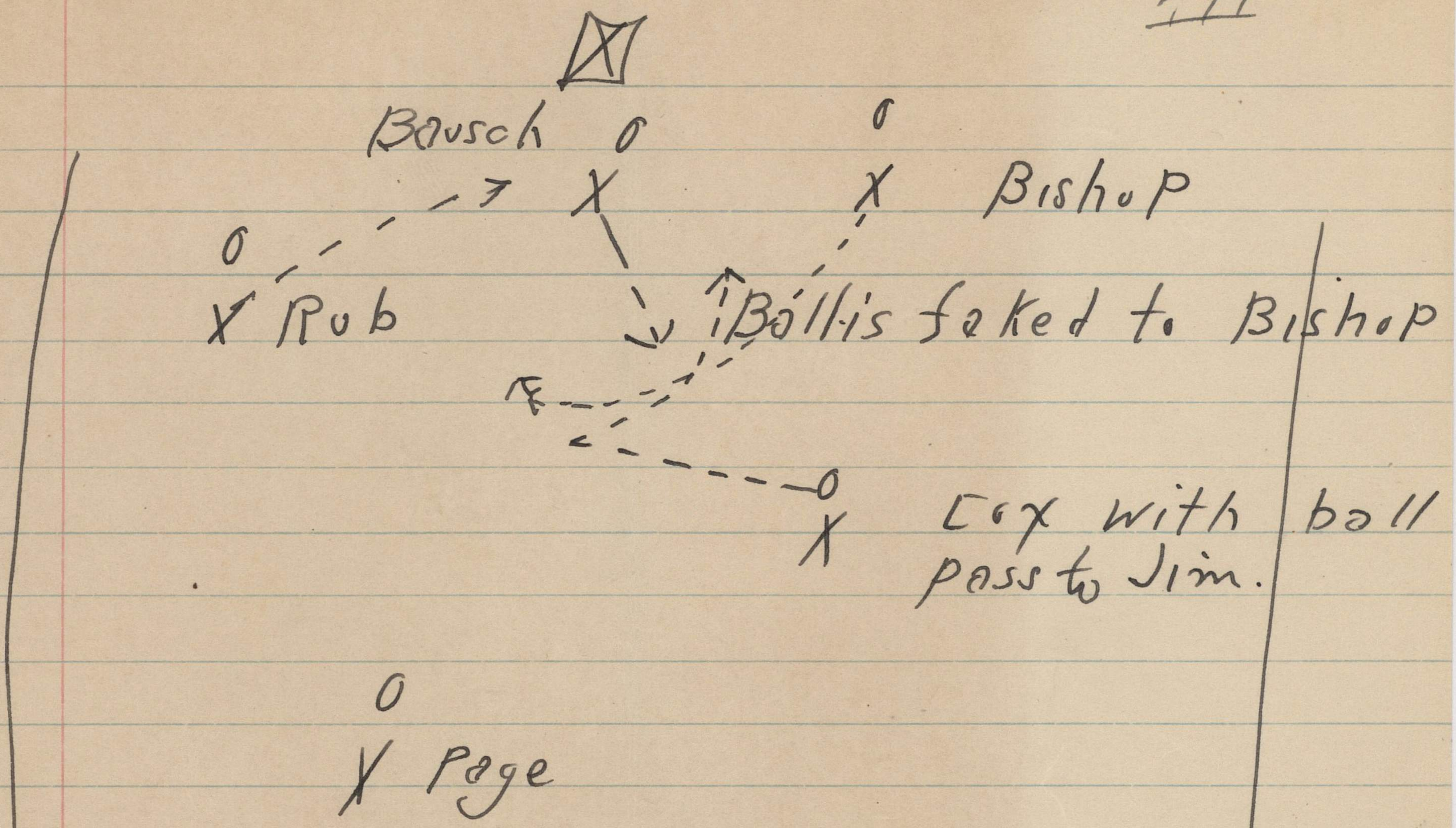

Ball passed to Bausch who comes out and takes it in the air. Bishop cuts in front of Bausch, who takes ball and cuts up toward basket. Cox cuts to left side of court and comes back cutting in front of Bausch for the ball. Got shot of it and missed. Because of this Cox may pop up with page handling the ball.

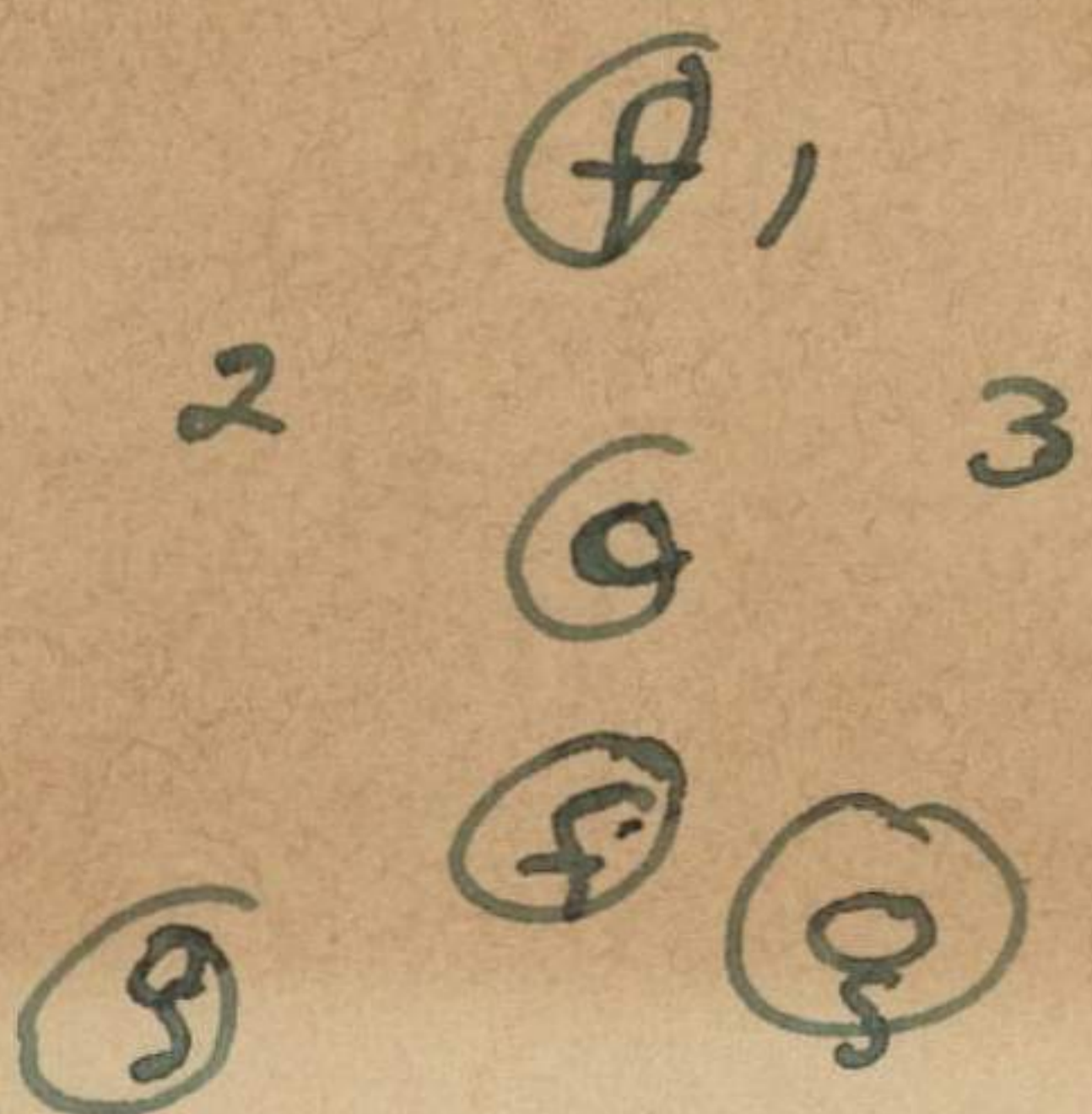
If you will excuse my green ink and all - I'll attempt to give you some information regarding California's style last season.

general

California plays a hard driving type of game using high passes to advance because of the size of the men. They do very little dribbling and are only fair on footwork both offensively and defensively. They handle the ball well and as a rule try for close in shots. They have no player who is exceptional on long shots.

Tip-off

Curtin is a good man (he knows it too) on tip-off. California did not show any great advantage in getting ball at tip-off. Here is the formation they used most of the time :-



F1 was R. Longery and he usually placed himself in positions 1, 2 or 3. He was good at getting the high tips as he drove in hard. Longery usually batted the ball immediately to one of his G's.



Fast break

Cal usually has a good fast breaking team. However last year they had a hard time getting the ball off of the defensive back-board against us and so Corbin (C) had to come back and help. They usually break down to the offensive basket going straight - but converging toward center of court. We intercepted lots of their passes. Some times the forwards cross going down on offense. They are good when it comes to having 2 on 1. usually the man bringing the ball to the guard & then faking a shot & passing to team-mate. They drive hard here and very often knock the Guard clear out of bounds. They do a lot of tripping in and out to foul line.

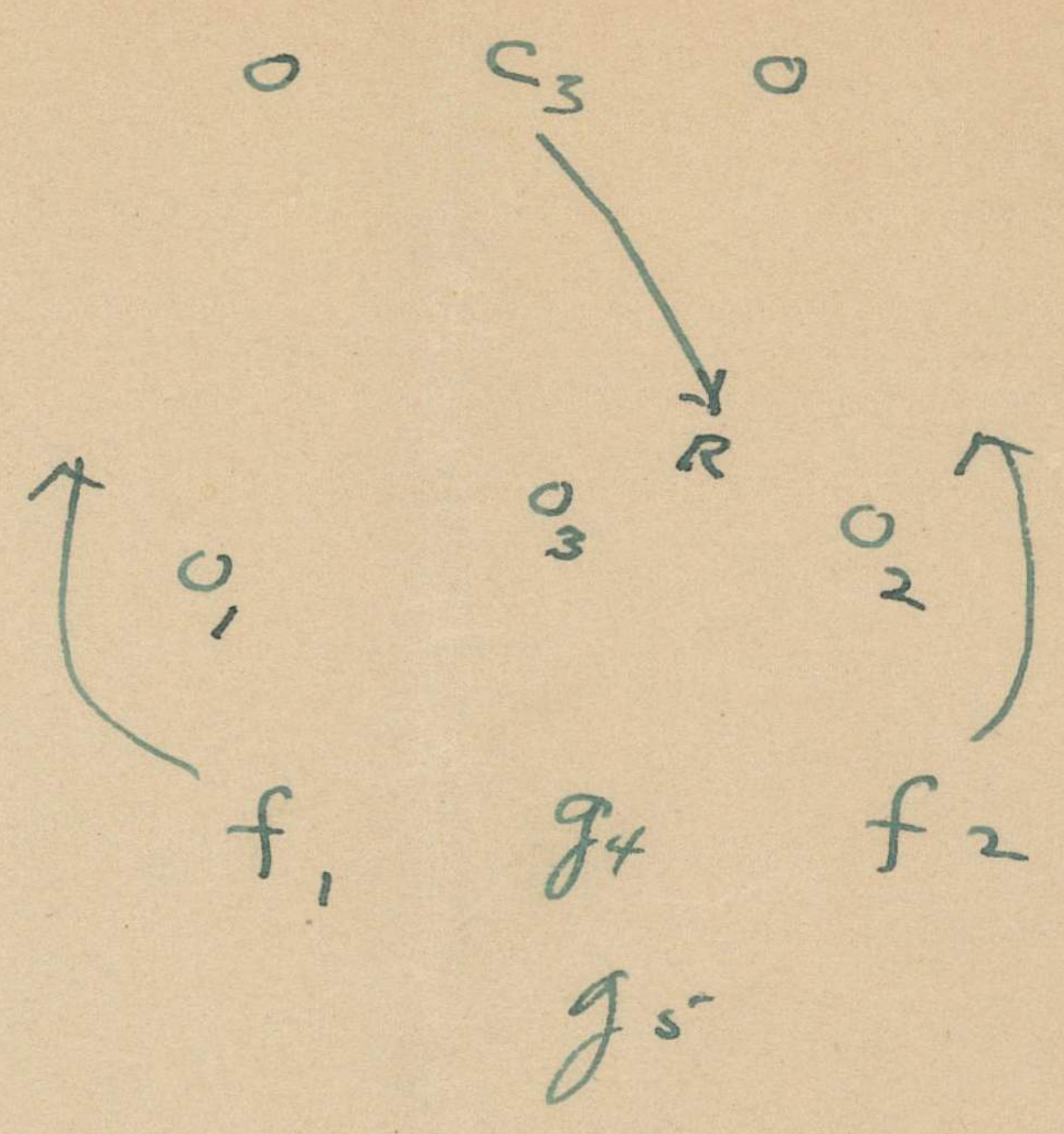
Slow break

They haven't (so far) shown that they know how to go about breaking thru your style of defense. We stopped them cold last year until our boys became all in. (We had no basketball a Stanford 2 weeks before our 1st Cal game on account of an epidemic of Infanatile paralysis and our boys didn't withstand that rest.) Unless they develop something new - here



is their slow break.

f<sub>1</sub>, f<sub>2</sub> and g<sub>4</sub> crisscross pass to front line of def. Then c<sub>3</sub> breaks out and gets a pass at R. C<sub>3</sub> hardly even turns toward basket but passes to some man outside.



the defense. (say g<sub>5</sub>). While c<sub>3</sub> is coming out f<sub>1</sub>, or and f<sub>2</sub> may be breaking in. (usually down sides.) as far as I could see they have no set block plays - but depend on driving thru any little opening you leave in your front line of def.

Selfense

Cal. considers their good following of shots as their chief defensive weapon - against a fast break. If you can get the ball off the bank (and I think Cal is having trouble finding a good rear guard.) you can go a long ways. We beat them back many times in our games last year.

Set self

Cal has used a combination of a man to man and shifting zone def. Murray best explain what they used against us by the diagram on the next page. Corbin (c) would come way out in the court to play around against x<sub>4</sub> and x<sub>5</sub>.

x<sub>4</sub> or x<sub>5</sub> would finally get away from

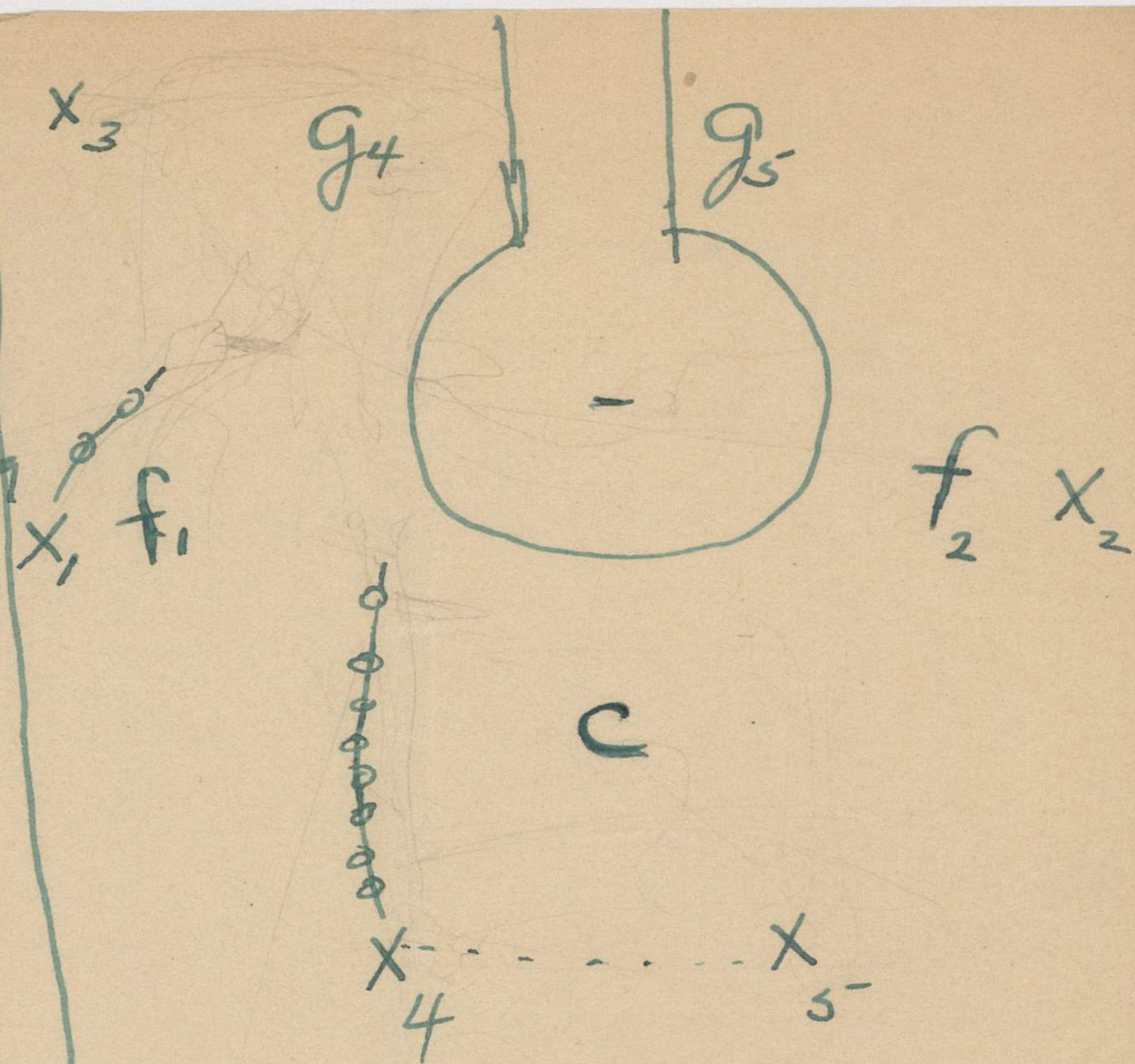

Corbin (he covering the man  
who stayed back.)

Take for example  $x_4$  receiving  
quick pass from  $x_5$  & dribbling  
in.  $f_1$  would very often  
leave  $x_1$  & go after  $x_4$ .

Then  $x_4$  would pass to  $x_1$ ,  
who would start in.  $g_4$   
would go after  $x_1$  &  $g_5$   
approach  $x_3$ .

You can see why we did  
break thru for easy shots  
when things went near right.



We also used 2 men in corners & their  
guards changed men when our forwards  
crossed from one side to the other.  
Their guards will not follow your men  
out very far.

Their defense may change some but I know  
"Nits" doesn't like man for man def for his  
team.

Cal hasn't played any games yet - so I will  
not get a chance to look them over.

I hope this will be of assistance to  
you as I appreciate the help I have  
already gotten at your hands. I am  
looking forward, with pleasure, to  
see you again.
