

Windsor Castle September 3

1835

The King has received Lord John
Russell's letter of yesterday which is very
satisfactory as have indeed been all His Reports
of the Proceedings in the House of Commons
on the Municipal Corporations Bill since
the Return of it from the House of Lords,
and His Majesty is very sensible of the
disposition which the Members of the House
have, (with the exception of a few whose
Support cannot be creditable or desirable
upon every occasion) shown to work the

the Exchequer which would result from any serious
collision with the House of Lords.

His Majesty was assured by
Sir Robert Peel when he resigned his office
that his conduct in Opposition would never be
influenced by any desire to embarrass His Majesty's
Government and that he would support it as
far as he could consistently with the Principles
he is bound to maintain and His Majesty is
convinced that Sir Robert Peel will be found
ready on all occasions of Public Emergency
to pursue that frank & honorable course which

has tended so much to His Credit at this
critical period. His Majesty cannot pay this
tribute to Sir Robert Peel without expressing
how John Russell that he fully appreciates
also the good feeling and the spirit in which
His Lordship has met the anxiety shown by
Sir Robert Peel and his friends to obtain a
general concurrence in the House of Commons
