My dear Carl:

I am very glad to get your letter of June 12th. It is the only word I have received so far from the travelers, but that is not strange as I know how difficult it is to get mail away from the Lake. We receive it more readily than we answer. For instance, if we get a letter away tonight and they go into Brainerd tomorrow afternoon, they may be able to receive my letter at that time, but if they try to reach me by putting a letter into the outgoing mail box, it takes a day or two longer for it to arrive. I may get a letter on the afternoon mail, but I am not at all worried as I am sure everything is all right.

Thank you for your kind expression in regard to Kansas Business Magazine. I walked to my desk one day and saw the Magazine lying upon it. It was the first intimation I had that my picture was to be used. As a matter of fact, while I sat for the picture a year or more ago, I had never seen it.

I am very glad indeed that Dolph and family have gone away. I know that Dolph needs the recuperation that will come from at least a month at the Lake and I sincerely trust that he will not return for at least thirty days. Marie, too, has been very faithful indeed in taking care of Dolph and I think, that while she looks first rate, the rest will do her a lot of good as well, and as for the boys, they simply love it at the Lake.

I am a little afraid that Frances may not be able to get up there this summer and it wouldn't be quite right without her, but perhaps she is doing such good work that her company will let her off for a week or two sometime during the summer.

Mrs. Simons is coming along, I think, just as rapidly as could be expected. It will be eight weeks Monday since the accident occurred. She has a four-legged arrangement in which three sides of the top is enclosed. She stands within the arms and uses
