Dear Charlie:

You either gave me a check or stuck it into my vest pocket yesterday, and I didn't see it until this morning. It was \$142.00, the balance that I had paid on Julia's funeral. I would have been glad to have had this part in paying her funeral expenses, but I thank you very much for the check, and I am sorry that I did not immediately notice it so that I could have spoken to you about it yesterday.

It seems like we were very busy and had little time to talk. I hope you had a pleasant trip to Tulsa and that everything is satisfactory.

You did not say whether you wished me to go ahead with having a marker made for Julia or not. The only occasion for haste would be to try to have the grave marked by Decoration Day which is the last of May.

I hope that you saw either Dolph or the Maloneys or both of them at Tulsa. We are always glad to see you, and I am sorry that we could not have had dinner at home yesterday rather than at the hotel, but as Gertie told you, our maid has every other Sunday off. She is a mighty good girl and we are glad to have her.
