Dear Calla:

I have your letter of February 15th and have read all of the clippings which accompanied it, and they are good, and I am returning same to you herewith.

I do not recall having received the letter you refer to which contained one of Norma's poems. I asked Gertrude if I had brought such a letter home and she could not remember that I had, so I think it is possible that that letter may have failed to reach me.

As I may have said before, I think that you and Mrs. Kathryne Drought, granddaughter of W. C. Cowdy, are of similar mind. She writes such good, sensible and intensely loyal letters and you do the same.

Your spoke of Garet Garrett's book "The Revolution Was". While I take the Saturday Evening Post, I rarely find time to read it, but Ernest Lindley, columnist and son of our former Chancellor, E. H. Lindley, wrote a book, I think in 1936, entitled "The Roosevelt Revolution". All of the methods successfully employed thru the years by Tammany are now being used successfully by the Roosevelt regime, and I believe that Pegler is right in his prediction that if the army and navy are able to put thru this manpower act, that it may be fastened upon us in perpetuity or until we actually have a revolution with all its accompanying death and destruction. These evils have been applied and multiplied so gradually thru the past twelve years that a generation of voters has come on who has known nothing else but F.D.R. I feel that the nation is in a sorry fix, but I am hopeful that when our soldiers and sailors return, that they will help straighten things out. I have talked with quite a number of service men, all of whom have spoken of their dissatisfaction with the conduct of the unions and of Roosevelt in his labor leadership. To insure his control of politics Roosevelt has sold the nation down the river and has piled a tremendous debt upon the very men who are now risking their lives in fighting for their country.
