we had three days of sunshine and moderate temperature that were very enjoyable, but the good weather did not stay on long enough to dry up the fields so that farmers could get into them and neither has the ground been frozen hard enough for some little time to enable the farmers to finish shucking their corm, haul feed, etc.

I was pleased this morning with the decision of Judge Sullivan of the Federal Bench in declaring illegal the seizure of the Montgomery Ward stores. He said it was a hard decision to make at this time when everyone wished to cooperate with the government as fully as possible, but in the matter of seizure, it concerned congress rather than the president, and if it is the intent of the government that such seizure should be made, then congress should pass laws to such an effect and the courts would carry them out. It was another setback for a willful, imperious president who undoubtedly despises democracy and doubtless looks forward to the day when he can exercise sole control of the lives, property and liberty of the people.
