Dear Joe:

I have a letter from Mrs. Freeman dated September 22, stating that you had not yet drained the pipes for our cottages. I understand also that they had a killing frost, and you know what a freeze would do to our pipes. I think this is the first time that you have delayed the work and I hope that you will see to it promptly if you have not already done so. The big storm in the gulf resulted in a heavy rain for Eastern Kansas, which was much needed to permit farmers to get the ground in shape for seeding wheat. A letter from my daughter who lives in Minneapolis, Kansas, which is in the north central part of the state, said they had no rain there, although it is much needed. We have not had a frost here yet, but are liable to have one at any time.

After you do your work for us, send us a bill and we will remit, as there is no need for you to wait for your money until we come up there next summer.
