
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

seems to me that the issues in our former wars were more clearly
apparent than they are today, and yet a good soldier is expected
to and should obey orders.

As I have told you, your forebears have fought on the right side in every war this country has had since the landing of the Pilgrims in 1620. Some of them were small wars, but they all seemed necessary and essential at the time in which they occurred.

In less than a month from today will occur what undoubtedly will be the happiest experience of your life. I was 23 in July before I was married in November. From what I have seen of Pam, I think she will make you a darling and helpful wife.

I shall be happy when conditions permit your retirement from the Marines to take up your responsibility with the Journal-World. When you think deeply of the matter, the publisher of a newspaper is in the service of his country or should be and is ever alert to aiding the advancement of his country's progress and to defend her rights in every way.

Whoever we have for president should be given our loyal support, but let us hope that in the future we shall choose wisely and select men who merit our greatest confidence.
