You will very likely remember me as the young correspondent, whom you met in Mexico City the past winter when you accompanied the editor and publisher good-will expedition. I have had it in mind to write you several times but my personal letters seldom reach more than the well intention status.

As I told you, I returned the first of the summer to New York to finish up my journalism course in Columbia University. I accepted a position, temporarily, with La Nacion, while I attended classes because of the peculiarity of school hours. Since then, I have resigned my Nacion position because it was only a project by which I could pay my school expenses and with little or no future attached to it.

I was more interested in returning to the small city field again since I have already had experience, there as well as in the big city. The small city newspaper providing of course it is located in a basically sound community, has interested me more than the Metropolitan daily. I should very much like to get a tryout on The Journal-World particularly in regard to advertising. If there is no advertising opening, at present, I would gladly accept a position in the city room in whatever capacity you deem advisable. You probably wonder why I wish to try advertising. It is simply that I, like most newspapermen, have visions of becoming my own small city paper owner in the future and a keen insight into the economic end is quite as essential as the editorial problems.

nefico August 22, 1928. Hon. S. Dutton-Pegram, Brittish Vice Consulate, Torreon, Coahuila, Mexico. Dear Mr. Pegram: I was very glad to receive your letter of July 17 which arrived during my absence. I also received a page from the Editor & Publisher from Victor Murdock which I pass on to you feeling that you will be interested. I should like to sit in with you again for a heart to heart discussion of Mexico and existing conditions of which you are so well informed. I was not greatly surprised at the death of Obregon. Some way I felt that the conditions were such that one might expect the violent death of either Calles or Obregon. When we were in the City of Mexico we were to be received at Charpulterec Castle by the President at twelve and we were given to understand that twelve meant twelve and not five minutes past twelve. In some manner, very undiplomatically, it seemed to me, we were to call on Gen. Obregon in the neighborhood of ten o'clock. This seemed to me to have been an hour unwisely chosen and one would naturally think that we should see the President first and the candidate for the presidency next. I did not go to see the General but those who did said that they were delayed until they did not see how they could possibly reach the Castle on time. I wondered at the time if there were anything sinister in this arrangement. On the face of it, here were two very big men who were ardent friends and ready to support one another. While this arrangement was beautiful, it isn't in line with the history of Mexico and of other modern and ancient countries somewhat similarly governed. Our return home was almost immediately saddened by the death of our youngest child, a promising boy of thirteen. We came home about noon on Monday and I did not see the little boy until he returned from school. We had a fine time together that night and the next morning I took him to school. At noon he came home complainHon. S. Dutton-Pegram, #2 ing that he did not feel just right and although he was seemingly getting along in a satisfactory mamer, he passed away very suddenly about three o'clock the next morning. So the thoughts of our visit to Mexico and our friends there will always be associated with this great grief. I shall always be glad to hear from you and am quite sure that I would enjoy reading your poetry. Dickenson, who owns and operates three theatres in Lawrence, and he said he would be greatly pleased to use your films at the Bowersock Theatre. Dear Sir :

I am writing to inquire if you would care to appoint me as your Veracruz correspondent for the Journal-World? There are good readable items of news occurring here and in the nearby towns, and in many of the Mexican gulf ports, which, I feel sure, would interest your readers. Besides these happenings, this year is the Mexican presidential year, and I would promise, if named your correspondent, to see that no news of value would fail to reach you.

Floods, earthquakes, and marine disasters, occur in Mexico quite often, and all this information I would forward to you as quickly as possible. When necessary, I would cable all news that required cabling. Cable rates to the United States have been reduced considerably since the Western Union took over the All-America cables, and newspapers receive an extra rebate ax on all their messages going to the United States or Europe.

I should be glad if you would favor me with a copy of your paper, and gladder still to have an opportunity to serve you.

Dear Mr. de Llano: - I certainly appreciate your kindness in having your New York Bureau furnish us with the files of Excelsior that we desired. Our return home was saddened by the sudden death of our youngest-child, a fine promising boy of thirteen, who was taken slightly ill at noon the day following our return and without having been considered in any way seriously or dangerously ill, passed away the following morning at 3:30. This great sorrow naturally crowded out of my mind for the time being, all thoughts of writing for the paper, but very shortly I hope to write some more letters in regard to Mexico, in which I shall endeavor to sum up the impression gained during our visit. We made a number of very interesting acquaintances and friendships and have a higher regard for the Mexican people than we had before. We trust that the relation between our two nations may continue to be friendly and cordial, and believe such a relation will be for the best interests of both Mexico and the United States.
