THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE DOUGLAS COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Article I

The name of the Society shall be The Douglas County Historical Society.

Article II

The objects of this society shall be the promotion of historical studies, and the collection and preserving of historical material and relics of Douglas County and vicinity in particular, and the State of Kansas in general, and such other activities as are enumerated in the Charter of the Society.

Article III

- Sec. 1. This society shall consist of charter, annual, life, and honorary members.
- Sec. 2. Anyone, approved by the Board of Directors, paying the annual dues, and placing or authorizing his name to be placed upon the membership roll on or before the date for the annual meeting in 1934 will be a charter member.
- Sec. 3. Anyone, approved by the Board of Directors, paying the annual dues, and placing, or authorizing his name to be placed upon the membership roll after the date of the annual meeting in 1954 will be an annual member.
- Sec. 4. Life membership shall be ten (10) dollars in accordance with the cost of Life Membership in the State Historical Society.
- Sec. 5. Anyone recommended by the Board of Directors may be given honorary membership in the society by a majority vote at any annual meeting.

Article IV

The annual membership dues shall be fixed at one dollar by the Board of Directors and may be changed from time to time to meet the needs of the Society, provided the society by a majority vote at any annual meeting may fix the dues for the succeeding fiscal year.

Article V

Sec. 1. The Board of Directors of this society shall consist of fifteen (15) members, those named in the charter constituting the first Board. At the meeting at which this constitution is adopted, this Board shall be divided into three groups: the first group to serve until the first annual meeting; the second group to serve until the second annual meeting; and the third group to serve until the third annual meeting. The annual meetings of the society shall elect successors to those directors whose term of office expires with that meeting and to fill the vacancies that may have occurred on the Board during the year. The term of office of all members elected to the Board of Directors shall be three (3) years except those elected to fill vacancies.

Sec. 2. Besides the Board of Directors, the other elective officers of this society shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a secretary and a treasurer, whose terms of office shall be one (1) year.

These officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of the society.

Article VI

The annual meeting shall be held at Lawrence, Kansas, sometime prior to November fifteenth of each year, the exact date and place to be fixed by the Executive Committee.

Article VII

Sec. 1. A quorum of the Board of Directors for the transaction of business shall be five (5) or more members.

Sec. 2. A quorum for the transaction of business at any annual or special meeting shall be ten (10) or more members in addition to any honorary members that may be present.

Article VIII

The president or, in his absence, one of the vice presidents, or, in their absence any member of the society who may be there chosen, shall preside at any regular or special meeting of the society.

Atticle IX

The secretary shall preserve a full and correct record of the proceedings of all meetings of the society, of the Board of Directors, and of the Executive Committee, to be entered in a book in chronological order. These records shall always be open to any member of the society. He shall conduct the correspondence of the society and preserve all communications addressed to him, and copies of all important letters or documents written by him. He shall collect all dues and other monies coming to the society and pay the same to the treasurer. He shall give notice of the meetings of the society and of the Executive Committee, but his failure or refusal to give such notice shall not invalidate the proceedings of any meeting. He shall keep a record of all books, papers, documents, and relics donated to the society or purchased by it, specifying the name of the donor in case of a gift, and a description of the article. He shall make an annual report to the annual meeting of all his transactions, and shall transmit a copy of this report to the secretary of the Kansas State Historical Society not later than the fifteenth of November of each year. In addition, he shall perform any other duty or obligation in keeping with the objects of the society that may be assigned him by the Board of Directors or the Executive Committee.

Article X

The treasurer shall receive from the Secretary all monies coming to the society and deposit the same in a depository designated by the Executive Committee and pay out the same on an order from the Secretary countersigned by the president.

Article XI

The Secretary and the Treasurer shall give bonds for the faithful performance of their duties in such sum as shall be determined by the executive committee. Such bonds shall be approved by the Executive Committee, whose chairman shall see that they are filed with the county clerk of Douglas County, Kansas.

Article XII

The Board of Directors shall have the management and control of the general business of this society, and shall at all time exercise such direction of the society and its affairs as may be lawfully exercised under the laws of the State of Kansas.

Article XIII

The Board of Directors may adopt by-laws for their own government and guidance, not inconsistent with this constitution.

Article XIV

The meetings of this Society and of the Board of Directors shall be governed by the usually accepted rules governing all parliamentary bodies.

Article XV

This constitutio: may be amended at any annual meeting of the society by a majority vote of all the members present; provided, the proposed amendment shall have been reduced to writing, and entered on the minutes of a meeting of the society or of the Board of Directors at least three (3) months previous to the holding of the annual meeting.

Article XVI

This society shall take and maintain a life membership in the Kansas State Historical Society.

November 18, 1939 Mr. J. W. Miller 1101 Louisiana Street Lawrence, Kansas Dear Mr. Miller: I have been informed that you have plowed all, or a portion of the old Franklin cemetery. If you will refer to your abstract you will find that Williams secured possession of certain real estate by a foreclosure of a mortgage on a man named Hawkins. He then sold it to Joseph Cox. Joseph Cox sold it to Al Cox and in each of these transfers two acres were reserved for a cemetery. When Charles Cox, administrator for Al Cox, disposed of the land to you he made no reference to the reservation for the cemetery, which are two acres ten rods west and eight rods north of the S. E. corner. The omission of this reservation in the administrator's deed does not void the earlier reservations for this cometery and therefore you have no title to this ground. Will you please restore this ground as nearly as possible to the condition it was in before you plowed it and replace the stones as nearly as you are able and greatly oblige the membership of the Douglas County Historical Society. This Society is trying to see that all of these old cemeteries are maintained in a decent and respectable condition. I have just completed my term as president of the Douglas County Historical Society and have been succeeded by R. C. Rankin, to whom this correspondence will be referred. A committee on policy composed of three members is to be appointed by the president to consider disposal of funds now on hand. The suggestion was made by W. C. Simons that it be used to establish, or help found, an historical society in Douglas County to collect and store in a fireproof room relics of historical interest, met with approval from a number of members. New Members Received The dinner was served in the crystal room of the hotel, the tables holding beautiful bouquets of roses and sweet peas thru the courtesy of the management.

After discussion the meeting authorized Prof. Raymond to take up with Kirke Mechem, secretary of the State Historical Society, the arrangements for a meeting in Lawrence to be addressed by Mr. Mechem.

It is expected that at that time the charter will be ready for adoption and signatures. The statement was made following today's meeting that as large a number as possible of signatures of those interested in historical matters will be sought for the charter and that it is considered advisable to have the heads of civic groups serve as ex officio members of the local society.

A small fund is available for the use of the society it was said. It will not be the purpose of the society to spend the money but to add to it until something worth while in the way of an historical memorial can be undertaken later on.

C. M. Baker, director of libraries at the University of Kansas, has set aside a room in Watson Library in which are collected a considerable number of articles of local interest. Many of them have more than local interest because Lawrence and Kansas History were chosely related in territorial and early statehood days.

DISCUSS FORMING A COUNTY SOCIETY

Committee Takes Steps to Organize Historical Group Here

Will Have Meeting

Plans for forming a Douglas County Historical Society were discussed at a meeting of the joint committee held Saturday at the Hotel Eldridge. The committee members were guests of T. J. Sweeney, Sr., at dinner.

Prof. F. N. Raymond was named chairman of the meeting. Those present were W. H. Sears; Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Beeks; C. E. Stephens and Mr. Sweeney, representing the Douglas County Old Settlers Association and E. G. Mason, A. B. Weaver and Prof. Raymond representing the Sons and Daughters of New England.

Members of the joint committee not present were C. E. Birch, X. J. Kennedy, W. C. Simons and Paul Dinsmoor.

Will Name Committees

At the close of the meeting three committees were authorized for the following purposes: (1) Arranging for a general meeting to form a Douglas County Historical Society; (2) To canvass possible places for safekeeping of historical materials; (3) To consider possible materials to be collected.

Attention was called to the necessity of arranging for a place to keep many valuable historical objects including records and relics. Much of this material is in Douglas county and connected with its history and it has frequently been suggested that arrangements be made to safeguard it for the future generations.

Mr. Mason proposed that instead of forming another society, a central agency or committee be chosen to cooperate with the various interested organizations and groups. This group to be operated by an executive committee consisting of delegates from the respective societies.

Invite Other Organizations

At a general meeting for definite action it will be asked that delegates be sent from such organizations as the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Grand Army, the Women's Relief Corps, civic groups, lodges and other groups.

SKINNER ELECTED HEAD OF SOCIETY

Permanent Organization of Historical Group Effected Last Night

Charter is Presented

The Douglas County Historical Society was permanently organized last night with a meeting in the Assembly Room of the Chamber of Commerce offices at which time the charter was presented to the organization and officers were elected for the ensuing year.

J. T. Skinner, who has been acting chairman during the forming and establishing of the organization and whose work was largely responsible for the success of the Seventy-fifth Anniversary celebration, was chosen president. O. J. Lane was elected vice president, Prof. F. N. Raymond, second vice president, Mrs. W. C. Spangler, secretary and W. H. Varnum, treasurer. Mr. Varnum's work as treasurer of the Seventy-fifth anniversary celebration recommended him highly for the position.

Fill Board Vacancy

Thomas H. Kennedy was elected to the Board of Directors to fill the vacancy created by the death of the late Gen. W. H. Sears, whose name is on the charter as a director during the first year of the organization's progress.

The constitution and by-laws were adopted setting the annual meeting date for sometime prior to November 15 in 1934 and thereafter. The annual dues were fixed at \$1.00 and life memberships will be set in accordance with the cost of life memberships in the State Historical Society.

President Skinner appointed an executive committee consisting of Mr. Lane, Mr. Varnum and Mrs. E. M. Owen.

Prof. F. H. Hodder and W. C. Simons were asked to prepare resolutions of appreciation for the work done in behalf of the society by Miss Carrie Watson and the Late Gen. Sears.



Adolph was an itinerant weaver who stopped at Lawrence in 1866 and 1867 and wove a number of coverlets of various designs and colors. All that I have seen carry the same border you describe. They are museum pieces and are specially interesting here in Douglas County. We have two examples --- one with sunflowers and the other with conventional medallions in the main part, but with the same borders. I couldn't tell you what yours should be worth as the value depends largely on finding somebody who wants such an article --- anywhere from \$5.00 to \$50.00. The condition of the coverlet is also a factor of course. If you should care to present the coverlet to Thayer Museum, your name as donor would be carried in the Museum Catalogue. February 5, 1936 Mrs. J. H. Wehr Friend, Nebraska Dear Mrs. Wehr: We have tried to find the information for which you wrote under date of January 24th. We are unable to advise you where you may secure pictures and descriptions of the various structures that have served as capitols of the state. We have a "History of the State of Kansas" compiled by A. T. Andreas, Chicago, 1883. In this history there are small pictures of the five territorial capitals. The First Territorial Capital was a two-story stone building 40 ft. by 80 ft. "well provided with seats and writing tables" and was located at Pawnee. The first Territorial Legislature met there July 2, 1855, but adjourned to meet at Shawnee Mission on July 6, 1855 for the balance of the session. The second Territorial Capital was the Shawnee Manual Labor School located in Shawnee, Mansas. The first territorial legislature continued in session there until August 30, 1855. The Third Territorial Capitol building was located in Lecompton. This is where the Second Territorial Legislature met January 12. 1857. The third territorial legislature met at Lecompton, Jan. 4, 1858 and organized but because of rooming difficulties the Legislature was adjourned on January 6 to meet at Lawrence. The Fourth Territorial Capital was located somewhere in Lawrence. possibly one door south of the present site of the Hotel Eldridge, but we have been unable to verify this. The third territorial legislature reconvened here because free hotel accommodations had been promised to the members of the legislature. The Fifth Territorial Capital was a building located in the 600 block on Massachusetts Street, Lawrence. The Fourth Territorial Legislature met at Lecompton on Jan. 3, 1859 but adjourned to Lawrence where the session continued until Feb. 11, 1859.

The Fifth, and last territorial legislature, met at Lecompton, January 7, 1861 but came to Lawrence on January 8th to reconvene. This session Adjourned on February 2, 1861. There is no mention made the book referred to above where this session was held, but the enclosed tear sheet from the Kansas City Times says they were in session at the Hotel Eldridge when word arrived in Lawrence that Kansas had been admitted to state-hood.

We, as members of the Society, also feel the loss of a personal friend. We had known him for years and took pride in his work at the University and the State Historical Society, of which he was president; and in his high standing as an historian. He was a coworker with us in the community, was a good citizen and our valued friend.

Straight and stalwart in figure, the years rested
lightly upon him, and no one thought of him as one who was
growing old. Our sense of loss is tempered by the realization that he was taken from us in the full strength of his
manhood, with mind and body unimpaired. He wrought a good
work and has left his impress upon all with whom he came in
contact.

We wish to make this expression of our high regard for Professor Hodder a part of the permanent records of The Douglas County Historical Society, and to have a copy given to Mrs. Hodder, carrying with it our sympathy and regard.
