In the death of Frank Heyward Hodder the Douglas
County Historical Society has met with a great loss. He had
taken a deep and helpful interest in our work and his scholarship and wide information made him a most valuable member.

We, as members of the Society, also feel the loss of a personal friend. We had known him for years and took pride in his work at the University and the State Historical Society, of which he was president; and in his high standing as an historian. He was a coworker with us in the community, was a good citizen and our valued friend.

Straight and stalwart in figure, the years rested
lightly upon him, and no one thought of him as one who was
growing old. Our sense of loss is tempered by the realization that he was taken from us in the full strength of his
manhood, with mind and body unimpaired. He wrought a good
work and has left his impress upon all with whom he came in
contact.

We wish to make this expression of our high regard for Professor Hodder a part of the permanent records of The Douglas County Historical Society, and to have a copy given to Mrs. Hodder, carrying with it our sympathy and regard.
