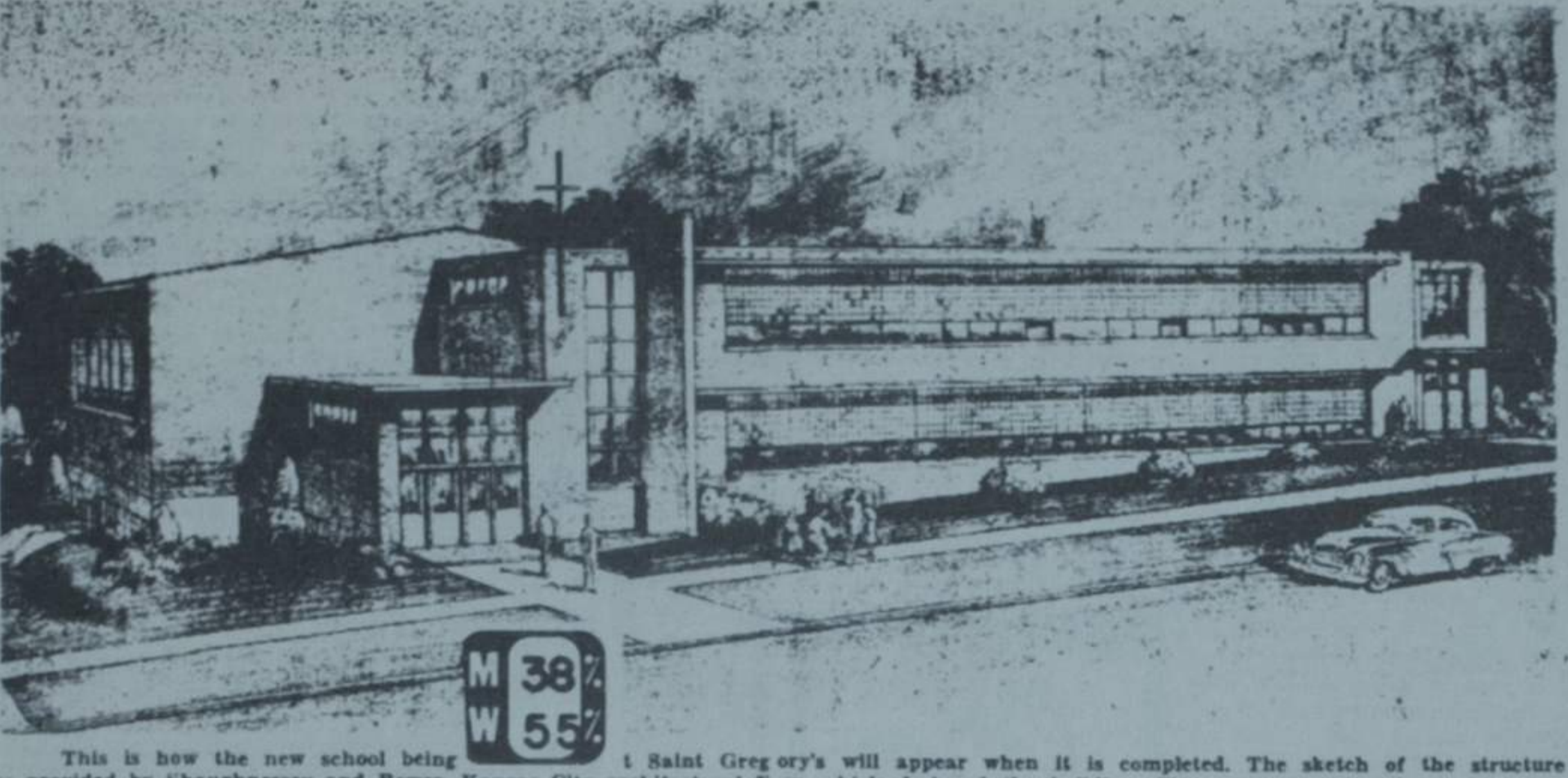


Grandmother At 16: Is Title Bestowed On Former Resident

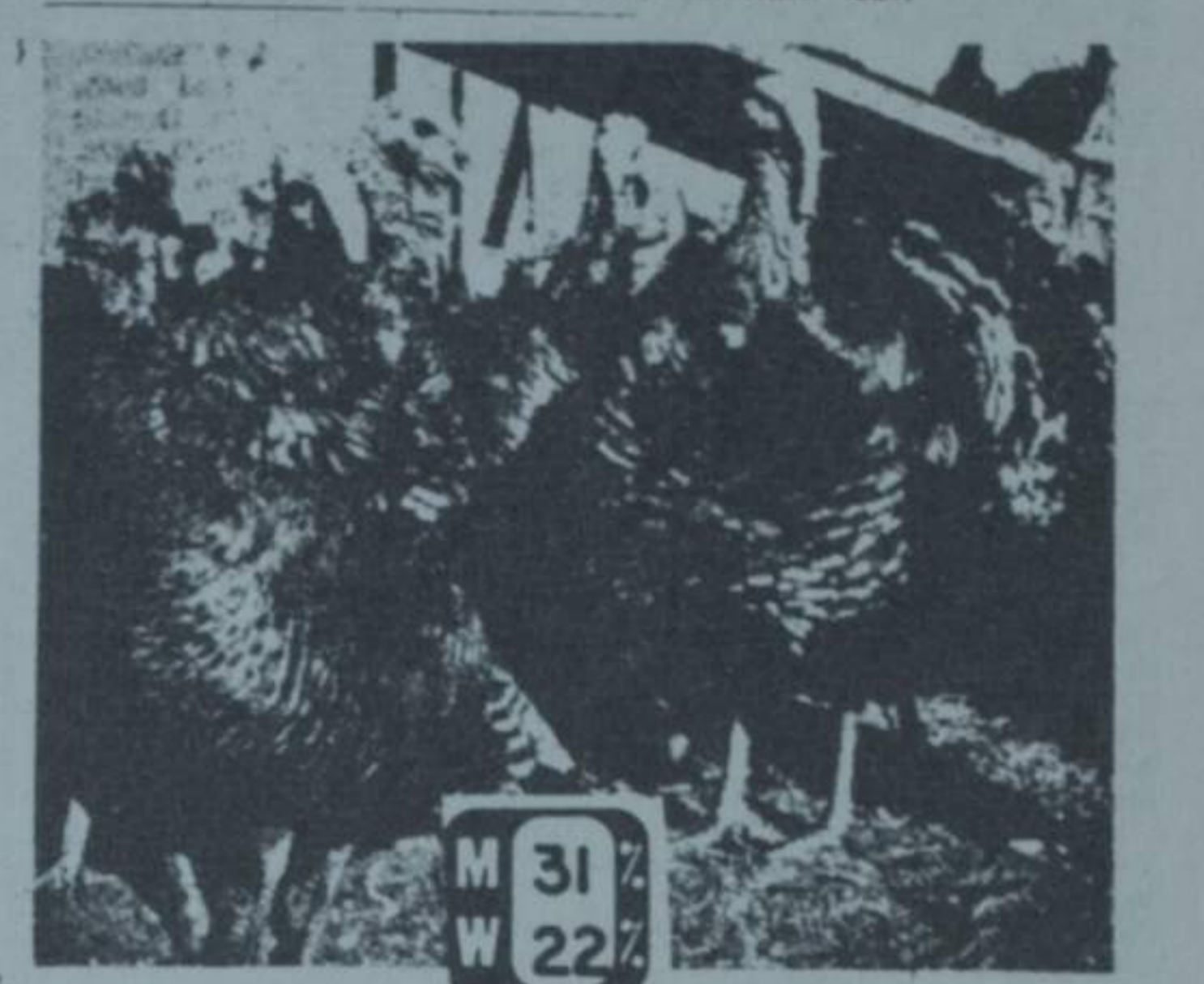
