Dear Dolph:

I returned last night from ten days in Nebraska and South Dakota and found your nice letter. I appreciate your broad attitude and think it's OK for two hunters to disagree...on some things. My main interest, and sincere one, is for a patrol out of politics, like the South Dakota game department.

Found time to hunt a bit while I was up there and was at Lake Andes for the opener, then did the rest of my shooting at Yankton and came home with 15 birds, three days' limit. They have the best pheasant crop in history and the birds are fat and nice, and I was fortunate enough to get all young ones.

Yesterday afternoon at Yankton I killed two with one shot. I spotted a cock on the edge of a field and when he rose I shot and a hen fell behind him about five feet. I did not even see her, but of course did not tell my companion that. Merely said it was a special shot I 'saved' for late in the day.. just in case.

Sent Busby a note on Geedy's silk parachute which might make a good Heard. You should have seen him when he pulled down on the first pheasant of 1940.....and shot out a thing like that.

I'll be down one of these days and will drop in and see you.
