Sir,

Mr. Harbin having acquainted me
that he intended to make you a Visit I was unwilling

your going down into the Countrey.

I do not pretend S^r to give you an Exact Detail of that
Extraordinary Affair Tho publick prints having doubtless
and probably a Manuscript Copy of his Tryall may
long ere now have reached your hands also I shall
endeavour will be by a short Observation or two upon
it to give you some Light into the Means by which
that unexpected Event was brought about.
