

At the Committee appointed to
enquire into the State of the Goals of
this Kingdom

Ann Jones the Widow of a Linen Draper who
became a prisoner for Debt in Newgate, and the
Daughter of a Mariner, belonging to a packett Boat
at Harwich being Examined in the most solemn
manner this Twentieth Day of April 1730. Saith That
she this Examinant was for some time a Barr keeper in
the press Yard in Newgate And that she was also a
Servant to one Brown a prisoner there And not being
fully employ'd by him she this Examinant was also
hired as a Servant to Thomas Bambridge then also
a prisoner in Newgate who gave this Examinant
half a Crown for the first Week and she was to have
two Shillings a Week afterwards And this Examinant
further saith That about a Month or five Weeks after
the said Bambridge's Commitment to the said prison
she this Examinant saw a person come to visit the
said Bambridge which person stay'd with the said
Bambridge for the Space of two Hours or thereabouts
And that about a fortnight after the said person came
again to visit the said Bambridge in Newgate both
which times were before the said Bambridge's first
Tryall came on but the Exact times this Examinant
cannot more particularly remember And the said
person then remained two or three hours in close
