John Campbell being Examined in the most solemn Manner this Twentieth day of April 1730. Saith that One Ann Jones who formerly waited on Mr. Bambridge while a prisoner in Newgate having Described to this Examinant a person whom as she says she took for a Priest that visited the said Bambridge And this Examinant apprehending from this Description that it was a person within the knowledge of this Examinant He this Examinant took the said Ann Jones with him to Chancery Lane and there in the Entrance of Serjeants Inn the said Ann Jones Seeing the Lord Chief Justice Eyre going from his Coach up to his Chambers the said Ann Jones then declared that he was the very Person she had so taken for a Priest as aforesaid - and this
