

and came again to the Charge but were put to the Rout a 2.^d time. Their Foot
began then to make off as did their whole Army, when they saw it was too late
to oppose the Our Army being all most all passed the Lines. About 11 we Extended
our Right Wing towards Terlemont, made ourselves Master of that place,
where we took a Battalion Prisoners. In this Action the Enemy lost 9 pieces
of Cannon, a pair of Kettle Drums 14 Standards & 8 Colours, and above 120
Officers Prisoners, among whom were the Marquis D'Aligre & Count de Horn
Lieut. Generals. Don Andreas Beniles Major Genl. dyed of his Wounds,
3 Brigadiers & sev. other Officers of Note.

N.B: The Enemy finding we did not pursue them, made a prodigious March
that Night, towards Louvain, by Andoign, passed the Dylo at Mever, and
Louvain, to defend that River which runs into the Demor.

N.B: We did not march till 9 in the Morning of the 19.th & when we came to Park
found the Rear of the Enemy, just passed the River at Hever; Our Horse took
about 800 of their straglers Prisoners.
