

laid down behind the Mill. The General visited the Posts in the Church Yard and judged it necessary to make 2 Traverses on the Roads that lead from the Lilly Port to the Village from securing the Church Yard from being surrounded on a sudden, and to give the Pickets time to come to their Assistance in case of Attack or forry from the Enemy, our Facines began to come in this day from Courtray and Waggon employed to go for Ammunition and other Services in the Siege from the Chatteries of Lisle an Ipres. At night the Traverses were made without any disturbance from the Enemy, several Messags and presents came from the Governour to the General Abundance of Women and Children got leave to come out of Town, This afternoon they cannonaded the line near the Gen's Quarters, one Man & 2 Horses killed, some part of the Line have moved nearer the Town & something more in view.

The Pickets of the Army to have their Arms ready and at the ringing of the Church Bell of Hallewyn to march to that Post and the Regiment ready to take Arms. A Captain 2 Subalterns 3 Serjeants & 60 to go to y<sup>e</sup> head of Webb's Regiment where they will find a guide to conduct them to the Bread Waggon, The out Guards to hinder all people from going in or coming out of Town, without a Drum or Trumpet with them, to get as much Forrage as you can in the fields but not to Forrage in Houses on pain of Death, no Soldier to be out of y<sup>e</sup> Camp who are found 1000 paces from it to suffer Death. Posts as usual, The Post with Letters go away Mondays and Thursdays.

The Enemy forted with about 80 Men horse and foot at the Lilly Port and set fire to some Houses near the River side under the Village of Hallewyn, and at the same time a small Party came from the scarp towards our outguards of Horse, on the right of the Village but
