make 2 Smocks or Fires and the Regiments who discover the
Signals to put themselves in a readiness and advertise the others
300 Men appointed to carry Gabions & Fascines

MB. We caused all the Woolpacks, Gabions and the other necessaries
to be carried into the Trenches and the Disposition of the counter-
scarp being made, about 8 in the Evening all our Cannon and
Mortars began to play, very warmly and the Troops marched
into the Trenches. Lieutenant General Sholts and Lord Orkney
commanded each at his own Attack and had under them a
Major General and a Brigadier with Sholts, Vane Pallant and
Swartzell, and with Lord Orkney Villat and D. Dargyl for each
Attack, there was 300 Grenadiers, as many Workmen and 300
Fuziliers to sustain them. The whole to be sustained by the 9
Battalions in the Trenches, between 7 and 8 o'clock the two
Mines were sprung for the Signals to Attack. Our Grenadiers
marched out with all the courage imaginable and beat the
Enemy immediately from the covert Way and our Workmen
began the Lodgement on the Counterscarp, but the Enemy made
so great a Fire from the Ravelin and other Works that Lord
Orkney was obliged, besides Fuziliers that sustained to cause
Ingoldsby's and Pallant's Regiments to March out of 4 Trenches
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
