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Soldiers Volunteers, not upon Command found in the Trenches shall be taken Prisoners. 700 for the Batteries relieved in the Morning by the same number 150 for each Attack the right to be relieved 150 and that of the left by 30 in the Morning the Gabions to be carried as near as possible 200 Workmen for the Commissary of the Fascines at 6 o'clock the blue Guards relieved by the same number in the Morning, who want money for the Workmen to go to Mr Brookhausen.

22nd This Morning we began to Fire from the 2 Batterys one of 6 and the other of 5 pieces of Cannon upon the 2 Pillions of the Bastions and continued all day. Our Mortars threw abundance of Stones into the Ravin and at night continued our Work and mounted more Cannon and our Miners had got to the Wall. The Enemy kept some Drakes a firing but did no great harm.

22nd For the Trenches Maj General Pallant and D Argyle; Batt^l North, Salisches, Albermarle, Stark croon pr. Tontland & Gromeo Workmen for the Batterys, Gabions, and Attacked as Yesterday but not March till called for. The Gabions and Fascines to be brought to the last parallel.

23rd Our Batterys and Mortars fired very briskly, till about 9 in the Morning The Enemy beat the Chamade and exchanged hostages. They sent out 2 Colonels and we sent in a Colonel & Lieut Colonel They made extravagant Demands but at last agreed to give us Possession of a Gate next Morning and march out the 25th with 4 piece of Cannon 2 Mortars and 8 Covert Waggon, to be conducted to Donay. My Lord Marlborough was here the time of the Capitulation.
