The Genl's Baggage followed by that of the Lines follows the Artillery, This Afternoon at 4. go to be at the Bridge to receive orders from the D^r M^r Genl. The Army is to march by the left in 2 Lines The Right Wing that Camps behind St Denis & Helchin, shall follow the March of the Hollands Fort of Mons: Salisches, Army to follow the Horse of the left Wing. The Danish Brigade to follow those of M Salische and those Regiments that are Camp'd behind the Brigade to fall into their posts upon the March. The D^r M^rs at 5. at the Bridges The Genl. at 5 The Assembly 1/2 an hour after and to March at 6. The posts near the Army and that at

Deffneis are to draw off this night. The Posts between the Army and Oudenarde to assemble to morrow at 12. at the Village of Aenghein and to follow the Army.

 Those of the Siege of Menin marched in 2 lines along the Inclosures made by the Grand Army and Encamp between Moenen, St. Denis and Helchin behind them, we marched by the left and had no Account of the Enemies making any Movement towards our hear tho there had been a Detachment of them all Night at Linsell upon the Avenues that lead to our Right
